THE GENEROUS PATH: CULTIVATING GENEROSITY THROUGH STEWARDSHIP

God's gift of generosity: Gratitude beyond stewardship

Stewardship season is upon us! You have received your stewardship packet in the mail by now, and you can look forward to one more week of St. Philippians reflecting in worship on what St. Philip and stewardship mean to them. Look also for the rollout of our webpage and some video remarks from more friendly faces that might be familiar to you!

This is the final column in this series, reviewing some ideas from a recent book by Presbyterian pastor, lecturer, and worship leader the Rev. Karl Travis. Your 2025 Stewardship Committee has adopted the title of this book, expressed above, to help us frame how we think about these things in our walk with God, no matter what time of year or "season" we might be in.

This year's stewardship season is built around three simple but profound questions:

- 1. How is God generous with you?
- 2. How might you be more generous with others?
- 3. How will our congregation be generous in the coming year?

Here are some concluding ideas Travis shares, to help close out our reflections of stewardship, gratitude, and God's generosity:

On tithing

In traditional language, when we share our resources, we "return God's tithe and our offerings." Many modern congregations now say "our tithes and offerings," but the older wording expresses a deeper truth: everything we have belongs to God. When we return *God's* tithe, we acknowledge that what we give is already God's gift to us. When we speak of giving *our* tithes, the focus shifts to what we do. The difference reminds us that generosity begins not with our action, but with God's abundance.

Is the Church theologically unique?

Should the Church be measured only by what it *does*—its programs, services, and outreach—or also by what it *is*? The Church is more than an organization; it is the body of Christ, called into being and sustained by the Holy Spirit. It is a covenant family into which God gathers the baptized, a worshiping people nourished at God's table and by God's Word. The Church is that beautifully diverse and even subversive community meant to embody and offer glimpses of the coming kingdom of heaven.

Your Stewardship Committee is grateful to walk alongside you in this season. Together we celebrate God's generosity, St. Philip's faithful witness, and the call to imagine how we can be even more generous in the year ahead. CAMPUS PLANNING UPDATE NOVEMBER 23

Following worship on November 23, we will have a congregational forum in Fellowship Hall with updates on our campus planning process. Earlier this year, the Session authorized an exploration of how to optimize our buildings and grounds to support our current and future ministry. The architectural firm English+Associates was engaged to lead this study. Among the topics considered was the current utilization of spaces across the church campus, maintenance costs, looming capital ex-



penditures, operational efficiency, environmental sustainability, and security. As the architects studied these topics, they met regularly with our planning team (Dan Boston, John Hartman, John Lemen, Rhonda Sands, Peter Schneider, and John Wurster) and gathered information from the congregation via a summer survey. At last month's Session meeting, the architects shared a very general design concept of an efficient campus plan that involves removing buildings that are past their useful lives and adding a new building that will provide better space for our ministry need. In response to expressed needs from the congregation, the plan seeks to preserve green space and developing more convenient parking. The Session received this report with a consensus that it should be shared with the congregation for review and comment. In addition to the forum in Fellowship Hall on **November 23**, a presentation will also be held in the dining room on **December 14** at 9:30 a.m. Please come and help us consider how best to use our resources in service to Jesus Christ.

EOUAL EXCHANGE & TARIFFS: A MISSION UNDER PRESSURE

You might have noticed at our Halloween pop-up sale on October 26 that we have had to raise the price of both regular and decaf coffee by \$1.00 each per bag. This is due to inflation and tariff disruptions. Tariffs hit Equal Exchange hard, since their business model rests on supporting small farmers across the world and enabling them, with our purchases, to create a sustainable life for themselves, their families, and their communities, all while caring for the earth by using cutting-edge organic farming practices.

FOUAL EXCHANGE

Equal Exchange, our co-op partner through the Presbyterian Coffee Project, is sponsoring a live Zoom event this Thursday, **November 6**, from 11:00 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. CT, to explain how tariff policy is affecting their trade relationships, and the implications for all independent businesses.

Here is some additional information:

- As a small, mission-driven business sourcing from farmer cooperatives and paying above-market prices, Equal Exchange is feeling the strain of the Trump Administration's new tariffs. With most of our products imported—like tea from India (50% tariff), chocolate from Switzerland (39%), and bananas from Ecuador and Peru (10–15%)—the fiscal impact is significant.
- While we typically share financial updates, this year we're also telling the story of how tariffs threaten our model, which prioritizes fair pay and community investment while running on modest profits.
- In this session, we'll break down how tariffs work, their impact on our business and trade relationships, and the broader consequences for independent companies. We'll also explore global trade shifts and who benefits—or suffers—from these policies.
- Join us for a presentation and conversation to learn more and engage in building a more democratic trade system.

LITERACY AND DEMOCRACY

In an interview with Thomas Newkirk (2023) Sondra Perl states:

Every voice in the room needs to be heard - whether it's a word, a line, a paragraph, an entire piece. It's bringing people's voices into the room, respecting those voices. It's listening to them openly, creating a dialogue among the ideas that populate the room. The job of the teacher is to listen really well. That's democracy at work.

In her recently released book, Why Fascists Fear Teacher, Randi Weingarten (2025) states:

Teachers fight for a better future for all - the common good. That is the core of public education - that everyone is embraced and accepted. Teachers and parents and community leaders and faith leaders who fight for better public schools, stronger democracy, and greater opportunity are fighting to make the nation better for everyone - including even the people attacking us. Because we truly all do better when we all do better.

Yet, in today's climate teachers are being intimidated, reassigned, and often terminated for showing up each day to serve as channels to better futures for all to the very best of their abilities. There is not time in the standardized test driven school calendar allowed for reading a whole novel. Imagine being asked to share what message you, the reader, got from *To Kill a Mockingbird* from a three paragraph excerpt. Books sit collecting dust, if they are even still on the shelves, in libraries without certified librarians.

Why?

Again, Weingarten (2025) states, "Yes, we teach reading and math. But we also teach young people to have confidence, to problem solve and be resilient. We also teach core American values..."

Dorcas is co-chair of Students Need Libraries (SNL) [https://www.studentsneedlibrariesinhisd.org/]. As a retired librarian she now serves as an active advocate for students' access to school libraries across Houston ISD. She is a frequent speaker at HISD school board meetings.
