CONGREGATIONAL MEETING

The Session has called a congregational meeting for Sunday, **September 27**, immediately following the 11:00 worship service. The purpose of the meeting is the election of elders to serve on the Session in the class of 2023. The meeting will be conducted via Zoom. You can learn about nominees below. A link will be emailed out the week of the vote for a Zoom meeting following the worship service, in which we will ask members to sign on and participate. (We will not have Coffee Hour on September 27.)

The Congregational Nominating Committee will nominate Gary Gardner, Susan Lange, Liz Miguez, Jeromy Murphy, Diane Weiss, Butch Wilson and Jennifer Wilson. Additional nominations may be made at the meeting with prior consent of those being nominated.

FYI—The membership of the Session consists of ordained and installed Ruling Elders and Teaching Elders (Pastors), all elected by the congregation. Session members are responsible for the spiritual oversight of the congregation and for oversight of all the programs and ministries of St. Philip. The Session carries out its work primarily through its Standing Committees. The session meets the third Tuesday of each month.

SUSAN ARNOLD LANGE

Susan is a member of St. Philip's Peacemaking and Social Justice Committee, and had the privilege of serving on Sessions in Austin and Fort Worth (where she chaired the personnel committee). She has been a psychologist for more than half her life, and was the clinical director at Interface-Samaritan Counseling Centers, where many members of St. Philip served as board members. Susan also teaches yoga. A long-time teaching elder friend describes Susan's theology as a "three-legged stool": In all things give thanks, God makes all things new, and God uses everything for good. Susan's most frequent prayer is "God, give me your view of me in this situation and help me cooperate with who you created me to be." Currently she is pondering what compassionate forgiveness of self and others looks like behaviorally. JEROMY MURPHY

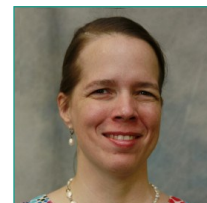

WORLD HOMELESS DAY DRIVE-THROUGH

Saturday, October 10—10 a.m. to Noon

The purpose of World Homeless Day, an annual event on **October 10**, is to draw attention to homeless people's needs locally and provide opportunities for the community to get involved in responding to homelessness, while taking advantage of the stage an 'international day' provides. The St. Philip Mission committee thought the Mission Rally was a tremendous success as you can see in the pictures throughout this newsletter. Therefore, they will be hosting another drive on Saturday, **October 10** to support SEARCH and The Beacon, two of our mission partners that assist homeless people.



SEARCH pursues a mission of *providing hope, creating opportunity, and transforming* lives for thousands of men, women, and children experiencing homelessness in our community. SEARCH brings this mission to life every day by helping our clients obtain permanent housing,

increase their income, improve their health, build community, and regain stable, self-sufficient lives.

SEARCH's work is carried out through intense, individualized case management and supportive services that help our clients every step of the way from the streets back into housing, work, and independence. We are working to make homelessness in Houston *rare, brief, and nonrecurring*.

SEARCH also serves the youngest victims of homelessness at the House of Tiny Treasures, a nationally accredited preschool for children whose families are or have been homeless. While the children are being prepared to succeed in school and beyond, their parents can go back to school or work and take the steps they need to get their lives back on track.

Last year, SEARCH helped more than 3,100 individuals who were homeless. We invite you to join with us and to be part of the solution as we strive for our vision of a Houston without homelessness.

More than 19,000 homeless individuals have been housed since 2011, including more than 6,817 veterans and 5,216 chronically homeless individuals.



Despite our progress, there is much work to be done. According to this year's annual homeless

count, there are approximately 3,900 individuals experiencing homelessness in Houston on a given night.

Over the course of a year, more than 56,000 individuals will experience homelessness.

We will be collecting notes of encouragement and snack packs for SEARCH.

Encouragement notes: Families can create encouragement notes to uplift those facing loneliness and isolation, or to congratulate those who have just moved into housing. Notes can include words of wisdom, quotes, artwork, and positive thoughts. The cards can be decorated with drawings and will be handed out by SEARCH staff to clients who need some uplifting.

Snack Packs: Please see the list below and choose three or more of the items to package in Ziploc bags to create snack packs. Clients often find it most helpful when snack packs contain a mix of no-chew (e.g. applesauce, pudding) and chewy items to accommodate all levels of dental health. We truly appreciate when individuals, groups, students, and children who want to give back prepare these packs. Thank you for thinking of SEARCH and our neighbors' basic needs!

- Session called a Congregational Meeting on Sunday, **September 27, 2020**, for the purpose of electing officers.

Committee and Council Actions:

- Mission Committee has approved holding a drive-through grocery drive for the Christian Community Service Center (CCSC) food pantry coupled with a donation drop-off of items for Seafarers boxes on Saturday, September 12.
- Mission Committee has approved holding a drive-through event in support and recognition of World Homelessness Weekend, Saturday, October 10. (Much like the Education Committee's event for Kids' Meals earlier this year, anyone wanting to participate can make snack kits at home for people experiencing homelessness, and then drop them off at St. Philip on Oct. 10. Committee members will deliver them to SEARCH.)
- Mission Committee has approved providing an emergency grant of \$1000 for our mission partner in the Yucatan, Rev. Pablo Estrella and the Bethesda Clinic, to repair damage caused by Tropical Storm Cristobal earlier this summer.
- Property Committee has approved the purchase of a new 20-ton dual circuit condensing unit which will cool the organ area of the sanctuary.

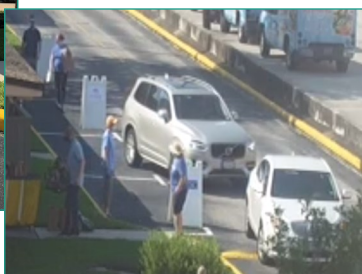
