April, 2014

Session approved Arts & Crafts Studio to do fund-raising at the Grand Opening on April 27, 2014 during the Spring Picnic and to have a small donation box permanently set for needed supplies.

Session approved the celebration of the Sacrament of Baptism of Victoria Gabrielle Lewis, daughter of Doug and Pam Lewis, on June 29, 2014, with the Rev. Dr. John W. Wurster officiating.

Session approved having one service of worship, at 11:00 am on Sunday, April 27, 2014, the day of Jazz Communion.

Session approved the celebration of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper at the youth worship on April 19th who will be breaking fast to conclude the 30 Hour Famine.

The 221st General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (USA) met June 14 to 21, 2014 in Detroit, Michigan.

Report from General Assembly

This letter, from Mike Cole, General Presbyter, New Covenant Presbytery, addresses one issue. A complete reporting can be found at www.presoutlook.org.

Brothers and Sisters in the Lord:

"For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." (Jeremiah 29:11)

I'm sure that most of you are aware that our General Assembly has approved an Authoritative Interpretation that affirms pastoral discretion in performing marriage ceremonies that becomes effective on Saturday, June 21, 2014. In brief, the AI allows PCUSA pastors to exercise their conscience in performing samesex marriages in marriage equality states.

In addition, the General Assembly is sending an amendment to all the presbyteries for a vote, which changes the language in the Directory for Worship to define marriage as "a unique commitment between two people, traditionally a man and a woman, to love and to support each other for the rest of their lives." It concludes with this important qualification: "Nothing herein shall compel a teaching elder to perform, or compel a session to authorize the use of property for, a marriage service that they believe contrary to the Word of God."

Lynn (Hargrove, Stated Clerk of New Covenant Presbytery) and I have created the attached FAQ* to address some of the initial questions you and your members will have about these actions. This FAQ will continue to be updated and posted on our presbytery web site for your use.

Even though this Authoritative Interpretation will not have a

noticeable effect on our congregations and pastors, I know it will be a cause of angst among our members, especially as they interact with neighbors and friends. It is likely that the media will misunderstand these actions and characterize them in ways that are inaccurate.

One of the challenges now before us is whether we will faithfully engage with brothers and sisters who differ from us on a matter that generates such heated debate and polarized division in the world around us. Can we show a more excellent way by remaining together in love and forbearance amid our differences? As we receive news of these GA actions, will we model the way of living that Scripture calls us to embrace: "Rejoice with those who rejoice, and weep with those who weep" (Romans 12:15) – even those who feel very differently about these GA decisions than we do?

KAH July Communion Offering

Kids Against Hunger at St. Philip continues to enjoy the outstanding efforts and support of our congregation. On average more than 12 of our members have participated at each of the eight food packing sessions conducted this year, helping to host the 370 volunteers who have shared this mission-outreach project. Our guests come from a broad spectrum of the Houston Community. Groups representing Stanford, Princeton and Rice universities, Catholic and Methodist churches, business concerns, scouts, and a traveling youth mission group have visited our campus. From our own presbytery, Young Nak youth and Memorial Drive Presbyterian Summer Mission Campers and families joined with us in this mission effort. The productivity of these sessions has increased the all-time number of rice casserole meals packed and delivered beyond 600,000. Monthly deliveries to Kid's Meals and CCSC now exceed 17,000 meals and more than a ton of our nutritious food has been distributed in Matamoros, Mexico.

Continuing to host visiting groups and share food at our current level requires more than \$20,000 a year. The Mission Committee has generously increased our budget share to \$6,000 this year. The New Covenant Presbytery Lynn Johnson Social Justice Fund has awarded our project \$1,480. Gifts from St. Philip members, supportive community groups, and special offerings have helped supplement this challenging amount.

The July Communion offering, to be received on July 6th, will be important in allowing our Kids Against Hunger satellite to operate at its full potential.

Tending the Garden

The St. Philip vegetable garden is blessed with abundance this summer. Early crops like radishes are all done, and now the tomatoes and peppers are coming in. Pests have troubled the squash a bit, but we're trying to use organic methods and avoid pesticides. Despite the bugs, we've been able to harvest both yellow squash and zucchini. Lettuce and collards continue to grow for another crop after one harvest. A couple of eggplant and cucumber plants, which can take the hot weather, are recent additions to the garden and will start producing before too long. All told, nearly 20 pounds of vegetables from our garden have gone to the CCSC food pantry at their Gethsemane location. Special thanks go to Susan Leonard and Lori Murphy for getting our fresh produce to the food pantry over the last six

In the planning stages is a new offshoot, a third small bed that will be devoted to the children of St. Philip and serve as a "lab" for the kids' connection to God's creation. They will be able to plant herbs or vegetables or flowers—their choice—and watch them grow. A Sunday School session in the garden is planned for later in June; stay tuned for more details.
