Lectionary Readings

<u>Liturgy of the Palms</u>

- Matthew 21:1–11 Jesus enters Jerusalem on a donkey; the people shout: Hosanna!
- Psalm 118:1–2, 19–29 Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord.



Organ music — The melody of the traditional Palm Sunday hymn "All Glory, Laud, and Honor" can be heard in both of today's organ voluntaries, in settings of the identical German chorale tune "Valet will ich dir geben" ("I bid you farewell"). At the opening of our service, the chorale tune appears in a trio texture, in an organ arrangement of a Bach cantata movement for soprano, oboe d'amore, and basso continuo. Bach's chorale fantasie, by contrast, thunders out the chorale tune in long notes in the bass, as a pedal *cantus firmus*, above which the hands engage in close imitation of each phrase of the same hymn melody with a fair amount of free embellishment.

Vocal music — Today's **solo** "Ride On, King Jesus" is an African-American spiritual, what was once commonly called a Negro spiritual. Most of the songs in this genre can be traced to enslaved blacks living in the southern United States in the century or so prior to the Civil War. Many spirituals contained hidden messages about freedom and veiled references to escape, and are thus called Underground Railroad songs. However, "Ride On, King Jesus" contains a text whose purpose appears to be a strictly spiritual one. Its melody brims with energy and brightness in its sprightly syncopations and sense of innocence
