

MUSIC NOTES

Organ music — Johannes Brahms' Op. 122, his final collection of pieces, comprises 11 organ chorale preludes, which are among the only works he wrote for the instrument. His setting of the German chorale tune *Herzlich tut mich erfreuen* ("My Heart Exults with Gladness"), today's **opening voluntary**, conveys a kind of gentle joy at the message of Easter though accompanying figuration that surges quietly throughout the texture of this little gem. • Bach's *Orgelbüchlein* (*Little Organ Book*) contains settings of a number of Easter chorale melodies, including the exuberant setting of *Heut triumphieret Gottes Sohn* ("Today God's Son Triumphs") offered as today's **closing voluntary**. Like many *Orgelbüchlein* chorale preludes, this particular example features its sturdy chorale tune in long notes in the top voice, while busy figuration beneath suggests the excitement of the Easter season.

Vocal music — Today's **first solo** *Risen Lord* was composed by English choir trainer and organist Barry Rose in 1997, during his final year as Master of the Music at the Cathedral and Abbey Church of St. Alban in Hertfordshire. Rose had previously served in cathedral music posts at Canterbury and St. Paul's London. Risen Lord is an anthem for young treble voices, with a text exhibiting the simple joys and innocence of a youthful celebration of the Easter season. • This morning's **second solo** references the appearance of the risen Christ to Thomas in today's gospel reading. The melody DUNLAP'S CREEK is an American shape note tune, named for a stream in Fayette County, Pennsylvania.
