MUSIC NOTES

Organ Music

Our worship on this Good Shepherd Sunday begins with an organ setting of "Brother James' Air," a tune to which the words of Psalm 23 are often sung. Its composer, M. Searle Wright, directed chapel music for two decades at St. Paul's Chapel at Columbia University and also taught for many years at SUNY Binghamton. Today's closing voluntary, by contrast, offers an echo of our closing hymn: its melody is explored contrapuntally by Johann Sebastian Bach in an ambitious chorale prelude—complete with pedal trills—from his youthful *Orgelbüchlein* (*Little Organ Book*).

Handbell Music

Today's **introit** is a new arrangement of two familiar hymn tunes — MADRID (Come, Christians, Join to Sing) and AZMON (O for a Thousand Tongues to Sing) — by American handbell specialist and composer Linda Lamb. The arrangement calls for just eight handbells, played by four ringers.

Choral Music

This morning's **first anthem** is by British composer Philip Stopford, who began his musical life as a chorister at Westminster Abbey in the UK, being trained under the direction of both Simon Preston and Martin Neary. He later held positions at Truro

Cathedral, Chester Cathedral, and Canterbury Cathedral, and he is now Director of Music at Christ Church (Episcopal) in Bronxville, New York, just outside New York City. His many compositions of choral music are noted for their relatively simple but highly evocative settings of traditional Latin and English prayers and hymns. *O Be Joyful* was composed in 2007.

Today's **second anthem** was originally composed for two treble voices with continuo accompaniment. It is found in Maurice Greene's collection of 40 Select Anthems, published in 1743 and considered his finest work. Though not well known today, Greene was one of the most important English-born musicians active in London during the time of Handel. Indeed, by 1735, before he was yet 40 years of age, Greene simultaneously held all of the major musical posts in England: Organist of St. Paul's Cathedral, Organist and Composer to the Chapel Royal, Professor of Music at Cambridge University and Master of the King's Musick. This morning we hear his *The Lord Is My Shepherd* in an arrangement for three voices and organ.

This is not just a morning hymn, though this excerpt from an English translation of an early 19th-century German text may not convey how thoroughly the original deals with different kinds of time throughout the day. The tune was composed as a setting for this English text.

Each stanza here pairs an invitation from Jesus with a response from the narrator. These three invitations recall how Jesus welcomed those who were heavy laden (Matthew 11:28), offered living water (John 4:10-14), and identified himself as the light of the world (John 8:12, 9:5).

This joyful Easter hymn brings together many images and responses evoked by Christ's Resurrection. As the second stanza affirms, it does turn mourning into dancing (Psalm 30:11), for this 20th-century text was written to fit the rhythms of this 16th-century Italian dance-song.
