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MUSIC NOTES

Organ Music

The *Tocatta, Adagio, and Fugue in C Major*, BWV 564, is one of Sebastian Bach's most ambitious works for the organ. Its exuberant opening movement, today's **opening voluntary**, pays homage to the North German *stylus phantasticus* style of writing especially, with abundant rhetorical flourishes and a virtuosic pedal cadenza. The closing fugue, today's **closing voluntary**, is Bach at his most joyous, with a gigue-like theme and sprightly development throughout.

Choral and Handbell Music

This morning's **introit** is by English composer, conductor and organist Eric Thiman, who published some 1,300 works during his lifetime, including many anthems, carols and canticles for church choirs. Using a traditional Ascension text from Psalm 47 *God Is Gone Up* is No. 22 of 24 *Introits*, published in 1961 for four-part choir and organ.

Today's spritely **anthem** *Judge Eternal, Throned in Splendor* was composed by Malcolm Archer for the choir of Bristol Cathedral, England. A distinguished conductor and organist, Archer served with great distinction at cathedrals in Norwich, Bristol, Wells, and St. Paul's Cathedral in London, and finally as Director of Chapel Music at Winchester College before his retirement in 2017.

This morning's **offertory** features a festive work for bells and chimes by Cynthia Dobrinski, who was an American composer and arranger of handbell music with more than 175 works in print. She was also an instructor and conducted many handbell workshops and festivals internationally. Dobrinski earned her Bachelor of Music degree from Texas Christian University and her Master of Music degree in organ performance from Northwestern University. She was a Fulbright scholar and taught for 15 years at the Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary. Her *Rondo-Passacaglia* for handbells was published in 1986 and is dedicated to her parents. Unlike many arrangers of music for handbells, Dobrinski very early on eschewed simply arranging hymn tune melodies (though she created many

fine settings in that genre as well), and set about composing a significant number of "free" pieces not based on any pre-existing melodies. *Rondo-Passacaglia* is one of these, providing an exuberant ride through the key of C major, with a brief side trip to A-flat major, and using the traditional compositional techniques of a repeating base line (the passacaglia) along with the structure of a repeating refrain-like phrase (the rondo) separated by contrasting material. Along with the rest of today's music, the work is a very fitting musical crown as we near the end of the Easter season!

The much beloved **choral benediction** sung at the end of this morning's service is by Peter Lutkin, who composed *The Lord Bless You and Keep You* in 1900. Orphaned at an early age, Lutkin was raised in Chicago and had his early musical training in the choir school of St. James Episcopal Cathedral. He studied under prominent organ teachers in Chicago, continued his education in Europe (1881-1884), and earned a doctorate in music from Syracuse University in 1900. In Chicago he served as organist and choir-master at St. Clement's Episcopal Church (1884-1891) and St. James Cathedral (1891-1896), and taught music theory at the American Conservatory (1885-1895). Having served as a piano instructor from the age of 21 at Northwestern University in Evanston, Lutkin later helped to found the university's renowned School of Music and served as its first Dean (1896-1920). In 1906 he founded Northwestern's A Cappella Choir, believed to be the first *a cappella* choir in the United States. Lutkin was a strong and vocal proponent of *a cappella* (unaccompanied) singing, and by the mid-1930s, largely due to his influence, *a cappella* choirs were ubiquitous in high schools, colleges, and universities all across North America. His own Northwestern A Cappella Choir was widely and highly regarded for its pure tone and exceptional balance, largely achieved by using no accompaniment, even during rehearsals.

This text on Luke 4:16–20, the author's first, was written for the United Presbyterian Women's National Meeting in July 1976 because the team planning worship could not find a suitable hymn on that passage. She wrote the words with this vigorous 18th-century tune in mind.
