Organ Music

Today's organ pieces both come from the American composer and organist Margaret Vardell Sandresky, who just celebrated her 100th birthday. A longtime member of the music faculty at Salem College in Winston-Salem, North Carolina, Sandresky also has an impressive catalogue of organ and choral music to her credit. Her *Three Devotions on Sicilian Folk Poems*, from which our **opening voluntary** is drawn, are all prefaced by short pieces of verse. "The Dove and the Olive Branch" takes as its inspiration these words: "Water covered the earth/Then a dove flew across the sky/And from its beak hung/A small branch of beautiful olives." The **closing voluntary**, written for a wedding celebration, is a tuneful march suitable for general use as well.

Choral Music


This morning's **introit** is by Peter Aston, who was a British composer and conductor, best known for writing a variety of liturgical choral works. Aston was active as a lay canon at Norwich Cathedral in England, and for fourteen years he was conductor of the Aldeburgh Festival Singers. *I Give You a New Commandment* was published in 1995, and is composed for two-part choir and organ, with many unison vocal passages perhaps representing the concord to which the anthem's text — Christ's *mandatum novum* — calls us.

Today's **anthem** uses a stunning text by American hymn writer and poet Richard Leach inspired by the words of this morning's gospel. Published in 1999, the simple musical setting of *Weave Your Net of Words* by Twin Cities composer Curtis Oliver calls for two-part mixed chorus with keyboard accompaniment, and features a clever melodic motive throughout that is evocative of the "weaving" idea. Oliver served for forty-two years as organist and director of music at Macalester Plymouth United Church in St. Paul, Minnesota. In addition to his work as a church musician and composer, he was also music director of KUOM, then the public radio station at University of Minnesota, from 1970 to 1993.


Handbell Music

Today's **meditation** is a new arrangement of the Brazilian folk tune — CANTAI AO SENHOR, or more commonly in Spanish CANTAD AL SEÑOR (O Sing to the Lord) — published in 2015 by American handbell specialist and composer Jason Krug, and calling for just twelve handbells, played by six ringers. The bells are enhanced this morning by the improvised sound of the djembe (pronounced JEM-bay), which is a West African rope-tuned skin-covered goblet drum played with bare hands.

This hymn comes out of the early 19th-century southern camp meeting experience, where believers were invited to pray for new converts, often likened to biblical characters such as Paul's jailer (Philippians 1:12–13). As its name shows, the five-note tune was created for this text.
