This paraphrase and expansion of Matthew 11:28–30 by a Canadian minister is structured so that the fir three syllables of each stanza provide the hymn's skeleton and summary. The immediacy of the text is enhanced by the folksong-like setting later composed for it.



Believe the good news. In Jesus Christ we are forgiven.




To sing, rather than simply say, a response to the Declaration of Forgiveness has the effect of making the moment both more affirmative and more corporate. The musical repetition of the two sentences also strengthens awareness of what it means to be assured of God's pardon.





This hymn was generated by 19th-century centennial celebrations: the words by the Declaration of Independence and the music by the adoption of the United States Constitution. Despite these origins, no specific nation is mentioned in this hymn of praise and prayer for peace.

MUSIC NOTES

Organ music — Today's organ **voluntaries** illustrate the long and complex musical relationships between America and its parent country. The British jazz pianist George Shearing left several volumes of organ works, including a set of variations on "I Know That My Redeemer Lives." This piece incorporates an early American hymn tune long associated with the hymn text, not the melody Handel composed for the same text in *Messiah*. The variations have Shearing's signature style, with the addition of a bit of faux Baroque counterpoint in the middle variations.

William Selby, a native of England, arrived in Rhode Island in 1774. Within two years, he had moved to Boston and was appointed organist of King's Chapel, which played a central role in the development of an indigenous American church music tradition. His charming voluntaries have fugal elements, in emulation of his favorite composers, Bach and Handel.

Vocal music — Today's **communion music** is among the most beloved passages from Handel's great oratorio masterpiece *Messiah*. At the low ebb of his career and, as a consequence of a stroke, suffering partial paralysis on his left side, Handel composed *Messiah* in the incredibly short time period of 21 days in the late summer of 1741. The composer had been invited to give a series of concerts in Dublin, some of which would benefit various charities. The Dublin premiere of *Messiah* was met with considerable success and served to boost Handel's spirits for a return to London. While it is true that George II stood during the singing of the mighty "Hallelujah" chorus at the second London performance, *Messiah* did not actually enjoy the popularity of many of Handel's other oratorios during the composer's lifetime. In fact, it was only through Handel's annual Eastertime performances to benefit his favorite charity, the Foundling Hospital, that *Messiah* was heard at all!

"He shall feed his flock" — with its lilting 12/8 siciliana characteristic of many pastoral scenes in music of the time — is the consoling centerpiece of the section that closes Part I of *Messiah* (Nos. 18-21, air/recitative/air/chorus). Handel's librettist Charles Jennens (1700-1733) made an inspired juxtaposition of biblical text choices here: "He shall feed his flock" is from Isaiah, and its continuation, "Come unto him, all ye that labor," from Matthew (the same words heard in today's Gospel reading). The music is presented this morning in its traditional version, with the solo line beginning in the alto voice and moving to soprano at the text change.
