

WORSHIP NOTES

To receive communion, please come forward via the center aisle, receive a piece of bread, and take a small cup of grape juice. Gluten-free bread is also available. You may return to your pew via the side aisles. Those with difficulty coming forward may receive communion in their seats by signaling the servers. Because the table of Jesus Christ is open to all, everyone is welcome to receive communion today.

An additional offering is received when communion is celebrated. Our beneficiaries for the January Communion Offering will be La Mision Benefactora Clinica Bethesda and El Centro Educativo Moises Saenz, our Mission Partners in the Yucatan supported by Rev. Pablo Estrella and his family. The programs provide education and medical assistance to the surrounding community, whose needs were great during the COVID-19 pandemic and are greater still as the world emerges slowly from its consequences. Many of the patients are out of work and suffer from illnesses that require treatment. With no resources to pay, the clinic's low cost/free services are lifesaving. The school trains its students to develop and apply their skills in their personal, family and social formation through a quality education based on Christian principles that honor God. You may also make a secure contribution through [MyStPhilip](#) or by sending a check to the church office, with "Communion Offering" in the memo line.

Today's worship service includes traditional Negro Spiritual music. The Black composers of this music are unknown to history and therefore unable to receive royalties directed to their estates for the use of their songs. To remedy this inequity, a fund has been created and approved by the Session where we will collect voluntary "royalties" for using this music. Anyone may donate to the fund by going to the [saintphilip.net](#) homepage and selecting *Make a Contribution*, then selecting Negro Spirituals as the fund. (For temporary administrative reasons only, this fund displays as Negro Spirituals/UNICEF.) Members can also access this page on the MyStPhilip app (also linked to from the homepage). You may also contribute by writing a check with *Negro Spirituals* in the memo line and placing it in the offering plate or mailing it to the church office. This small gesture of reparation seeks to help heal the long history of injury to Black persons. Contributions received over the course of the year will be donated annually to a local organization supporting Black musical traditions.
