

#### **Today's Lectionary readings:**

- Jeremiah 29:1, 4–7 Build houses and plant gardens in exile; seek the welfare of the city.

- 2 Timothy 2:8–15 Remember Jesus Christ, raised from the dead; that is my gospel.

#### **MUSIC NOTES**

Today's **voluntaries** come from the collection of *Ten Voluntaries for the Organ or Harpsichord* by English organist and composer John Bennett, his only known works to this day. Bennett's voluntaries are substantial and show a high degree of sophistication and originality, with some scholars referring to them as the most remarkable contribution to the post-Handel period in England. The voluntaries also carry ornamentation common to late-Baroque style: the trill (or shake), the beat (a modern equivalent to a short mordent), and the appoggiatura (placing a dissonant note on a strong beat).

Giuseppe Pitoni became one of the leading musicians in Rome during the late-Baroque period. Although his lifespan overlaps heavily with the great Baroque masters like Bach, Handel, and his Italian contemporaries like Vivaldi, Pitoni's music also reflects more Renaissance characteristics, especially his early works in part due to intensive study of works by Palestrina in his late-teens. Pitoni's con-

tributions to liturgical music in Rome were profound. He was extremely prolific as a composer, organist, *maestro di capella* ("chapel master"), and scholar on music theory and history, penning over 3,500 documented compositions. *Cantate Domino*—an adaptation from Psalm 149: "Sing to the Lord a new song"—reflects Pitoni's refined style and presents the text in a clear ABA form, today alternating between full choir and a quartet.

Continuing our song of praise, today's **offertory** is a version of the well-known hymn "Praise to the Lord, the Almighty," arranged for a small group of handbells. The hymn's author, German composer Joachim Neander, may have drawn inspiration from Psalm 150: "Let everything that has breath praise the Lord." Paired with Pitoni's setting of Psalm 149, it creates a natural continuation of the theme of joyful praise.
