

#### **WORSHIP NOTES**

Today, on World Communion Sunday, a gift to the Peace and Global Witness Offering enables the church (that's you!) to promote the Peace of Christ by addressing systems of conflict and injustice across the world. St. Philip's Peacemaking and Social Justice Committee has recommended, and Session has approved, **Angry Tias and Abuelas of the Rio Grande Valley** to receive the 25% of the Offering retained by the local congregation to connect with the global witness of Christ's peace. The Angry Tias and Abuelas' mission is to provide necessities for health and safety, and support for human dignity and justice, to individuals and families seeking asylum at our borders and as they embark on their journeys to designated destinations in the US. The Presbytery of New Covenant receives an additional 25% for ministries of peace and reconciliation, and the remaining 50% goes to the Presbyterian Mission Agency to advocate for peace and justice in cultures of violence, including our own, through collaborative projects of education and Christian witness.

#### **MUSIC NOTES**

#### **Organ Music**

Nicolaus Bruhns was one of the most important North German organists of the generation immediately preceding that of Johann Sebastian Bach. A student of Dietrich Buxtehude, Bruhns left a small number of vocal and organ pieces in the North German "fantastic style," which mixes rhetorically-inspired rhapsodic passages with discrete fugal sections. His *Praeambulum in G minor* has but two sections: an improvisatory-sounding opening section and a short fugue on a lively theme.

Spanish Renaissance composer Antonio de Cabezón was Western music's first keyboard virtuoso. Blind from early childhood, Cabezón left an extensive body of organ works, most of which were first heard during his long service as organist and chamber musician to the Spanish royal family. His *Pavana su glosa*, as its title suggests, is a short set of variations (literally, "glosses") on a pavane, a stately dance tune.

#### **Choral Music**

This morning's **introit** is by English composer, conductor and organist Eric Thiman, who published some 1,300 works during his lifetime, including many anthems, carols and canticles for church choirs. Much of Thiman's choral and organ music was written for Nonconformist (i.e., non-Anglican) churches, and Thiman himself was a Congregationalist by birth. *From the Rising of the Sun* is No. 2 of 24 *Introits*, published in 1961 for four-part choir and organ.

The **anthem** is by Harold Friedell, who was an American organist and music educator who taught at both Juilliard and Union Seminary in

New York City, and who served during the last two decades of this life as Organist and Master of the Choir at St. Bartholomew's Church (Episcopal) in Midtown Manhattan. Friedell composed music marked by a noble simplicity of means, but powerful in its sentiments and direct setting of beautiful texts. *Draw Us in the Spirit's Tether* is the perfect example of these qualities, using this now famous text from 1931 by English clergyman and prolific hymn writer Percy Dearmer in a setting for SATB choir and organ.

The **communion anthem** *Draw Near* is by British composer and conductor Jonathan Willcocks, son of the great conductor and organist Sir David Willcocks. Like his father before him, Jonathan has composed a not insignificant body of works for various combinations of voices. Written for four-part choir and organ, *Draw Near* was published in 1996 using a text by the composer based on the 7th-century Latin hymn *Sancti venite*, *corpus Christi sumite*, translated in 1861 by John M. Neale.

Immediately following the communion anthem is an unaccompanied **communion motet** for SATB voices by American composer and organist Howard Helvey, who serves as organist and choirmaster of Calvary Episcopal Church in Cincinnati, Ohio. *O sacrum convivium* is one of the most beautiful and engaging Latin Eucharistic texts, and Helvey's musical setting fits it well, with beautiful harmonies and gently flowing movement, and not a single accidental in the score.




