



WORSHIP NOTES

Today's worship service includes traditional Negro Spiritual music. The Black composers of this music are unknown to history and therefore unable to receive royalties directed to their estates for the use of their songs. To remedy this inequity, a fund has been created and approved by the Session where we will collect voluntary "royalties" for using this music. Anyone may donate to the fund by going to the <u>saintphilip.net</u> homepage and selecting *Make a Contribution*, then selecting Negro Spirituals as the fund. Members can also access this page on the MyStPhilip app (also linked to from the homepage). You may also contribute by writing a check with *Negro Spirituals* in the memo line and placing it in the offering plate or mailing it to the church office. This small gesture of reparation seeks to help heal the long history of injury to Black persons. Contributions received over the course of the year will be donated annually to a local organization supporting Black musical traditions.

MUSIC NOTES

Today's **opening voluntary** comes from Dietrich Buxtehude, the famed Lübeck organist who was a leading light of the North German Baroque. His non-chorale based organ works tend to feature multiple sections, alternating between rhapsodic figuration and short fugues. One of the more concise examples of this genre, the Praeludium BuxWV 152 features toccata-like opening and closing sections around two brief fugues on the same subject but in different meters.

This morning's **anthem** incorporates the words of one of the most familiar of Renaissance-era prayers: "God be in my head, and in my understanding." The concise setting by British composer Philip Wilby treats this text with simple elegance, first as simple melody then in four-part harmony.

At the **offertory** the St. Philip Choir offers an arrangement by Victor C. Johnson of a traditional African

American spiritual. A native of Dallas, Johnson is a prolific composer and arrangers with hundreds of choral works to his credit. He currently serves as Minister of Worship and the Arts at Shiloh Baptist Church in Plano, TX. His *Keep Your Lamps*, scored for mixed choir and piano accompaniment, reminds us in a straightforward yet jazzy manner of the brevity of the Christian year—and of life itself.

Liselotte Kunkel teaches composition and piano at the Würzburg Musikhochschule (conservatory). Her jazzinspired organ works include a setting of *Erfreue dich, Himmel, erfreue dich, Erde* ("Be glad, heaven; be glad, Earth") that is today's **closing voluntary**. Its text, based on Psalm 148, celebrates all of God's creation.






The opening line of this hymn was inspired by the three divine attributes listed in 1 Timothy 1:17 (King James Version), and it continues by considering how God's life exceeds our own finite existence. The text is well set to a Welsh melody shaped by many three-note units.



This text and tune were written to conclude a hymn festival at the 2009 Annual Conference of The Hymn Society in the United States and Canada. Four parables framed both the festival and the hymn: the Mustard Seed, the Prodigal Son, the Good Samaritan, and the Ten Bridesmaids.
