



MUSIC NOTES

Organ Music

Today's organ voluntaries are drawn from Bach's Well-Tempered Clavier, Book II, his second collection of 48 preludes and fugues for keyboard instrument in all the major and minor keys. This volume's Prelude in E-flat Major, with its easy swinging rhythm and gentle melodic curves, channels the galant style of the 1730s and early 40s, the likely compositional period of its individual prelude and fugue pairs. The E-flat Fugue, by contrast, embraces the "antique style" of fugal writing common during the generation before Bach, with its broadly declamatory theme and sophisticated counterpoint. These pieces, though commonly heard on the harpsichord or piano, are equally at home on the organ; some (like this pair) actually benefit from the added sustain of the instrument.

Choral Music

This morning's **introit** is by English composer, conductor and organist Eric Thiman, who published some 1,300 works during his lifetime, including many anthems, carols and canticles for church choirs. Thiman was a master of works in miniature form, as evidenced in this little jewel encompassing just 16 measures of music. *I Wait for the Lord* is No. 4 of 24 *Introits*, published in 1961 for four-part mixed choir.

Today's **first anthem** is an arrangement by British composer John Barnard of the much-beloved African American spiritual *Steal Away to Jesus*, often sung by church choirs around this time of year as lectionary readings turn to themes of the end times and the Second Coming of Christ.

This morning's offertory anthem was once a staple of Protestant American church choirs, sung with regularity especially during fall stewardship season. Treasures in Heaven was written in 1940 by Joseph Waddell Clokey, who was an American educator, organist and composer of sacred and secular music in the first half of the 20th century. His works include two symphonies, including the "Dorian" Symphony, two orchestral suites, a string quartet, a cello and violin sonata, twelve choral works in large form, five operas, organ suites, many organ pieces, and more than a hundred published choral works. Clokey's father (also named Joseph Clokey) was a Presbyterian pastor, and this was certainly an influence on the younger Joseph Clokey's focus on sacred music. He was one of the most widely sung composers in churches during the 1950s.*





The Nazi appropriation of this tune for propaganda purposes has clouded a noble piece of music first associated with this text in 1889. In a 1779 collection, the author indicated that this hymn is primarily based on Isaiah 33:20-21 with allusions to several other passages.



The pace and diversity of modern life often hinder us from remaining vulnerable to our emotions and to the humanness of other people. This prayerful text to be open to such joys and pains draws on Ezekiel 11:19 and 36:26 in stanza one and echoes Jeremiah 31:33 in stanza two.
