We hear the song of Mary, lauding the lowly and humble,


but we listen to a culture that values pride, possessions, and power.



WORSHIP NOTES

Today's worship service includes traditional Negro Spiritual music. The Black composers of this music are unknown to history and therefore unable to receive royalties directed to their estates for the use of their songs. To remedy this inequity, a fund has been created and approved by the Session where we will collect voluntary "royalties" for using this music. Anyone may donate to the fund by going to the <u>saintphilip.net</u> homepage and selecting *Make a Contribution*, then selecting Negro Spirituals as the fund. (For temporary administrative reasons only, this fund displays as Negro Spirituals/UNICEF.) Members can also access this page on the MyStPhilip app (also linked to from the homepage). You may also contribute by writing a check with *Negro Spirituals* in the memo line and placing it in the offering plate or mailing it to the church office. This small gesture of reparation seeks to help heal the long history of injury to Black persons. Contributions received over the course of the year will be donated annually to a local organization supporting Black musical traditions.

Music Notes

Organ Music

Today's organ voluntaries are settings of the German chorale melody *Freu dich sehr*, o meine Seele (Rejoice, O My Soul), a tune that also appears in the Calvinist tradition as GENEVAN 42, to which we sing the words of the hymn "Comfort, Comfort Now My People." Bach student Johann Ludwig Krebs made a name for himself as an organ virtuoso in the mid 18th century, with chorale fantasies and free works that give free reign to galant-style counterpoint. His fantasy on *Freu dich sehr* frames its highly decorated melody with an elaborate ritornello. The chorale-based works of Georg Böhm, by contrast, represent an older style of organ composition, one less concerned with elegant turns of phrase and more devoted to motivically based counterpoint.

Handbell Music

Today's handbell introit is an arrangement of the well-known Advent hymn tune NUN KOMM, DER HEIDEN HEILAND. The arrangement is by South Dakota handbell specialist, composer, and music educator Cathy Moklebust, composed in 1996 for the Hosanna Ringers of Nativity Lutheran Church in St. Anthony, Minnesota. In the composer's own words, "Savior of the Nations, Come illustrates the quiet anticipation characterizing the Advent season; anticipation of the arrival of a Savior who came to earth in human forth to reclaim us from sin. This mysterious and melancholy music reminds us not only of the events of 2,000

years ago surrounding the birth of Our Lord, but the continued, patient anticipation of yet another Coming."*

Choral Music

This morning's **first anthem** is one of the many beautiful settings of African American spirituals by Harry T. Burleigh, who in his day was instrumental in bringing Black music into the mainstream of the time by arranging it in more classical forms. Burleigh himself was a classical composer and world-renowned baritone. His setting of My Lord, What a Mornin' originated in a 1918 arrangement for solo voice and piano the great Black artists Marian Anderson (1897-1993) and Paul Robeson (1898-1976) both performed this arrangement. Burleigh subsequently made a cappella arrangements of this spiritual for SSA and SAATTBB choruses. The adaptation by Albert Blackwell heard this morning calls for SATB voices and uses the piano accompaniment from Burleigh's original solo-voice version.




FINANCIAL UPDATE

This Advent text artfully interweaves what is hidden and what is revealed, primarily in the coming of the long-awaited Messiah. But Christ himself taught us about another hidden truth, his presence in the "least of these" (Matthew 25:40, 45), whom we are also called to welcome.



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While all four gospels identify John the Baptist with the prophecy of Isaiah 40:3, this text (well set to a vigorous Welsh tune) draws on the report of his preaching in Matthew 3:1–12. The final lines recall that he was the first to name Jesus "the Lamb of God" (John 1:29, 36).

This hymn shows how once-unconnected parts can work together. The text about John the Baptist was written in Latin in the 18th century and translated into English in the 19th century. Similarly, the 17th-century melody was adapted to its present form in the 19th century.
