



#### Today's Lectionary readings:

- Isaiah 2:1–5 Turn swords into plowshares; walk in the light of the Lord.
- Psalm 122 I was glad when they said, "Let us go to the house of the Lord!"
- Romans 13:11-14 Salvation is near: wake up; live honorably; put on Jesus Christ.
- Matthew 24:36–44 The Lord is coming; keep awake; no one knows the day or hour.

**CONGREGATIONAL MEETING**: The Session has called a meeting of the congregation for **TODAY**, immediately following the 11:00 a.m. worship service. The purpose of the meeting is to elect an elder for the Session Class of 2028; an elder for a one-year unexpired term in the Session Class of 2026; and a member to serve a two-year term on the congregational nominating committee. William Rowe is being nominated to serve on the Session in the Class of 2028; William Howard is being nominated to serve for the one-year term on the Session in the Class of 2026; Mary Grace Carter is being nominated to serve on the nominating committee. Additional nominations may be made at the meeting with prior consent of those being nominated.

#### **MUSIC NOTES**

Longtime organ professor at the Vienna Academy of Music, Anton Heiller left a large body of music for the instrument, including a set of variations on the Advent chorale "Nun komm, der Heiden Heiland," which we sing this morning as "Savior of the Nations, Come." These variations, from which come today's **Opening** and **Closing Voluntaries**, epitomize Heiller's compositional style in their obsessive rhythms, thoroughgoing counterpoint, and gently modernist harmonic style.

To begin this season of Advent, we present the opening lines from the traditional Christian hymn, *Gloria in excelsis Deo* ("Glory to God in the highest") in two distinct styles: an excerpt from a Medieval, chant-like version as our **introit**, followed by the opening movement of Vivaldi's popular larger work *Gloria*, RV 589 as our **anthem**. Both versions of the ancient text offer glimpses of past musical styles—although the former was com-

posed in the late 20th century—and depict a joyful celebration in anticipation of the coming of Christ. This morning's service also represents the first of several that will highlight the Advent portion of the "Gloria" through RV 589, most of which will also be performed as part of our Christmas concert on December 7th at 5:00pm.

Also drawn from RV 589, today's **offertory** sets just two lines of text from the "Gloria," which comes at the end of the transition from the opening Advent section to the more Doxological . Vivaldi depicts the spirit of the text through a serene and peaceful mood with many pastoral features such as its meter (12/8) and a lilting oboe obbligato—a perfect way to open the season of Advent.

Though some hymns attributed to Ambrose are doubtful, this one seems rather surely to be by him. Luther's German version (commemorated in the tune name) dropped one syllable from each line of the Latin text, giving the hymn its characteristically declarative Lutheran form.





# Hymn 94

#### Now the Heavens Start to Whisper



This Advent text artfully interweaves what is hidden and what is revealed, primarily in the coming of the long-awaited Messiah. But Christ himself taught us about another hidden truth, his presence in the "least of these" (Matthew 25:40, 45), whom we are also called to welcome.
