



WORSHIP NOTES

Advent Candle lighting is led this week by the Godly Play Sunday School class. Teachers are Omi Ford, Joyce Fox and Ruthie Waldrop.

To receive communion today, please come forward via the center aisle and receive a piece of bread. Gluten-free bread is also available. You may dip the bread in the chalice of grape juice and receive communion by intinction or you may take from the tray a small cup of grape juice. You may return to your pew via the side aisles. Those who have difficulty coming forward may receive communion in their seats by signaling the servers. Because the table of Jesus Christ is open to all, everyone is welcome to receive communion today.

An additional offering is received when communion is celebrated. The Christmas Joy Offering has been a cherished Presbyterian tradition since the 1930s. The Offering distributes gifts equally to the Assistance Program of the Board

of Pensions and to Presbyterian-related schools and colleges equipping communities of color. The Assistance Program provides critical financial support to church workers and their families. Presbyterian-related schools and colleges provide education and leadership development while nurturing racial and ethnic heritage.



LEADERSHIP: PAST, PRESENT, AND FUTURE

Today's Lectionary readings:

- Jeremiah 33:14–16 The days are coming; God's promise of salvation will be fulfilled.
- Psalm 25:1-10—O Lord, teach me your paths; you are the God of my salvation.
- 1 Thessalonians 3:9–13 May God strengthen your heart until the coming of the Lord Jesus.
- Luke 21:25–36 Signs in the heavens show that the kingdom of God is near; be alert.

MUSIC NOTES

Today's opening voluntary is J. S. Bach's organ setting of the Advent chorale Wachet auf, ruft uns die Stimme ("Sleepers, Wake"). His original setting of this famous trio may be found in his church cantata Wachet auf, where it's scored for violin obbligato, tenor, and continuo. The composer's arrangement for solo organ appeared in a collection of six such works published in 1748 by Johann Georg Schübler, long known colloquially as the "Schübler Chorales." Our closing voluntary treats the same hymn tune, though in a contemporary manner. Its composer Emma Lou Diemer taught for many years at the University of California at Santa Barbara. Prolific with keyboard music and hymn settings especially, Diemer was fond of updating familiar melodies with catchy rhythms and free mixing of modes and keys.

Throughout the season of Advent, we will be offering selections from Handel's timeless oratorio *Messiah* beginning with the opening recitative, "Comfort ye, my people." Adapted from the first verses of Isaiah chapter 40, the text brings a message of comfort after a tumultuous period described in the first 39 chapters, foreshadowing a godly visitation in the coming of Christ. In a similar narrative, the recitative –along with the corresponding aria that you will hear next Sunday– in the

key of E major redeems the preceding drama of the orchestral overture, which is in the parallel key of E minor.

Our **anthem** is a subdued setting of the familiar hymn text "Come, Thou Long Expected Jesus" by Charles Welsey. In contrast to the more commonly sung version based on the joyous HYFRYDOL hymn tune, this version by Allan Petker leans into the mystery of the Advent season and the anticipation of the coming Christ. Each passing verse tells the story of hope and forgiveness yet to come, an assurance that is musically withheld until after the final chord.

In a similar vein as Handel's opening recitative, today's **offertory** consists of two selections that encompass the bringing of light into darkness, a transformation most clearly demonstrated as the opening text is transformed from minor to major mode at the arrival of the phrase "but the Lord shall arise." A natural pairing, both pieces are musically bonded in both melodic material and tonality (B minor) with the first piece ending in a dominant harmony that leads directly into the second.




LAUDA ANIMA 8.7.8.7.8.7



This text uses imagery from Jeremiah 33:14–16 and Matthew 24:29–36/Mark 13:24–32/Luke 21:25–36. These passages are especially associated with the beginning of Advent, a season that looks forward to Christ's second coming while also preparing us to remember his first coming.



This Advent text artfully interweaves what is hidden and what is revealed, primarily in the coming of the long-awaited Messiah. But Christ himself taught us about another hidden truth, his presence in the "least of these" (Matthew 25:40, 45), whom we are also called to welcome.
