

MUSIC NOTES

Organ Music

Today's **organ voluntaries** are both based on the German Advent chorale *Wachet auf, ruft uns die Stimme* ("Sleepers, Wake! a Voice Is Calling"), which can be found at No. 349 in the hymnal. Bach's setting originated in his Cantata 140 as a trio movement scored for violin obbligato, tenor, and continuo. The composer's own arrangement of this delightful piece for organ solo appeared in a collection of six such works published in 1748 by Johann Georg Schübler, which have long been known colloquially as the "Schübler Chorales."

In early 1931 Hugo Distler became organist of the Jakobikirche in Lübeck. He wrote most of his organ music for the two instruments in that venerable Gothic church, especially the smaller of the two instruments, whose origins date from the fifteenth century. Four years into his Lübeck tenure, he composed two works on the *Wachet auf* chorale melody: a motet and an organ partita. Considered by many his strongest work for the organ, the partita exemplifies Distler's neo-Baroque compositional aesthetic in its intricate yet dancelike counterpoint, rhythmic vitality, and fidelity to Philipp Nicolai's 1599 chorale. Its opening Toccata closes our service of Lessons & Carols.

Choral Music

Today's **introit** is a joyful four-part canon by French composer and organist Jacques Berthier. Born into a musical family (both of his parents were musicians, his father organist of Auxerre Cathedral), Berthier was approached in 1955 to compose music for the then-fledgling monastic community of Taizé, some 200 miles southwest of Paris. Six years later he became organist at the Church of the Jesuits in Paris, Saint-Ignace, where he worked for the rest of his life. In 1975 Berthier was again asked to write music for Taizé, this time for increasing numbers of young people from around the world coming to worship there. By the time of his death in 1994, he had composed some 232 songs in 20 different languages. *Prepare the Way of the Lord* is one of these, written for the Taizé Community in 1984.

This morning's **first choir carol** was arranged in 1994 by is by University of Houston professor of composition David Ashley White, who served as director of the UH Moores School of Music from 1999 to 2014. David also serves as composer-in-residence at Palmer Memorial Episcopal Church, his home parish. *Comfort, Comfort Ye My People* is his setting of a familiar Advent tune from 1551 attributed to Louis Bourgeois. The congregational version of this carol may be found in the hymnal at No. 87.

Our **second choir carol**, also by David Ashley White, was composed in 1997. Featuring an original melody with familiar words, combined voices sing the first verse in

unison, then the second verse appears in canon, with the upper voices following and employing some slight rhythmic alterations to keep the mixed-meter tune aligned between the parts. True harmony appears in the third verse, although it slips in and out of a unison line, creating the feeling of the harmony emerging. A new melody appears in the fourth verse ("I'm weary with my former toil..."), effectively heightening the impact of the words. The fifth verse returns to the main tune with a descant above. As the piece closes, echoes in the lower voice bring a calming sense of closure.

Today's **third choir carol** is a brilliant setting by American composer and organist Howard Helvey of words translated from an early Greek hymn by Scottish clergyman and prolific hymnodist John Brownlie. The music of *The King shall come when morning dawns* was composed by Helvey in 2017, and the anthem was the winner of the 2018 Sewanee Church Music Conference Choral Composition Prize. The overall musical form is ABABA (plus a short coda at the end), with the "A" section essentially being a newlycomposed Common Meter (86.86) hymn tune. Multiple rhythmic meters are applied throughout the work, serving to underscore the natural scansion, or syllabic stresses, of the text.

This morning's **fourth choir carol** is a Basque noël reflecting the archangel Gabriel's Annunciation to the Virgin Mary that she is to be the mother of the Messiah. The choral arrangement from 2000 is by retired English composer, organist and conductor, Malcolm Archer, who served with great distinction at cathedrals in Norwich, Bristol, Wells, and St. Paul's in London, before retiring in 2017 as Director of Chapel Music at Winchester College.

Today's **offertory carol**, Will Todd's *Lighting the Way*, was "written for the 'Lighting the Way Festival' in Durham Cathedral in 2000, [and it was] sung by thousands of North East school children as part of their visits to the Cathedral over the course of several weeks. It was written with the intention of being easy to pick up, and this has made it a popular worship song, beyond the context of the original commission."*

This morning's **communion carol** *Lost in the night* is a setting from 2000 by American composer Kyle Haugen for piano and voices of an old Finnish folk tune, making use of simple, rather Nordic harmonies to underpin this text about a Advent people in darkness searching for light and waiting for a Savior.

'Sometimes we just need help'

The Rev. Sunjae Jung heard God's call loud and clear. Although maybe not so clearly at first.

"When I heard about a Korean-American Presbyterian church in the Atlanta area, my first answer was, 'I don't think it's my calling,'" he said. "Since I was living in Korea at the time, my first answer was no. Then, they contacted me again and told me the church was in a university city. I remembered being an international student in America when I was young and how much the church there helped me."



He continued, "Serving as a minister in Korea, I remember praying that if I ever

had a chance to help international students the way the church helped me when I was at Iowa State University, I would take it," he said. "I talked with my wife and our senior pastor in Korea, who said they thought this was a good calling for me. After praying some more, we decided to come serve this church."

The Athens Korean Presbyterian Church's mission is to welcome and serve the larger university and especially the Korean community. It is not a "big budget" congregation, as most of its members are young and transitory. But Rev. Jung couldn't possibly have anticipated the impact that Covid would have on both the congregation's and his family's finances when they moved to Athens in December 2019.

With the arrival of the pandemic in March 2020, not only did the church cease all its in-person activities and move Sunday worship to a streaming platform, but the whole town practically shut down.

Because Rev. Jung serves the congregation on a religious visa, he is not permitted to earn income beyond that of his ministry and the family found itself struggling to make ends meet. In December 2021, Rev. Jung sought and received an Emergency Grant split between the Assistance Program of the Board of Pensions and Northeast Georgia Presbytery.

This grant was made possible, in part, by the Christmas Joy Offering, which distributes gifts equally to the Assistance Program and to Presbyterian-related schools and colleges equipping communities of color.

Rev. Jung said, "I thank the denomination for the help from the Christmas Joy Offering. I can say that after going through such a difficult time last winter, the big burden on me and my family was lifted."

Sometimes we all could use a little help, and those who serve our Church are certainly no different. Please give what you can to the Christmas Joy Offering for when we all do a little, it adds up to a lot.




