ABOUT TODAY'S MUSIC

Today's **organ voluntaries** are settings of the German chorale melody *Freu dich sehr, o meine Seele* ("Rejoice, O My Soul"), which is the same tune as Genevan 42, the basis for this morning's sermon hymn. Bach student Johann Ludwig Krebs made a name for himself as an organ virtuoso in the mid 18th century, with chorale fantasies and free works that give free reign to galant-style counterpoint. His fantasy on *Freu dich sehr* frames its highly decorated melody with an elaborate ritornello. The chorale-based works of Georg Böhm, by contrast, represent an older style of organ composition, one less concerned with elegant turns of phrase and more devoted to motivically-based counterpoint.

This morning's **choral introit** comes from a collection of introits for unaccompanied choir based on chant precedents by Richard Proulx, who was among the foremost American church musicians of the 20th and early 21st centuries. Proulx was a prolific composer of sacred choral and congregational music especially, and served for many years as Director of Music at Chicago's Holy Name Cathedral. Today's **anthem** *O comfort now, my people* is a direct musical reflection of the Isaiah readings heard during the Advent season, here set in an unusual and captivating melodic mode by Texas composer Thomas Pavlechko, who serves as Director of Music and Organist at Christ the King Catholic Church in Dallas. The **offertory solo** is by the American jazz pianist and composer Dave Brubeck, arranged in 2012 by Paul English for a Jazz Mass at Trinity Episcopal Church here in Houston.
