

WORSHIP NOTES

Communion today is received by intinction. Please come forward via the center aisle, take a piece of bread, and dip it into the chalice of grape juice. You may return to your pew via the side aisles. All the bread is gluten-free and the serving station closest to the windows has individual cups of grape juice. Persons with difficulty coming forward may receive communion in their seats by signaling the servers in the side aisles. Because the table of Jesus Christ is open to all, everyone is welcome to receive communion today.

An additional offering is received when communion is celebrated. Gifts brought forward during today's final hymn support the Presbyterian Christmas Joy Offering, which provides assistance to current and retired church workers in their time of need and develops future leaders at Presbyterian-related schools and colleges equipping communities of color.

Today's readings from the Revised Common Lectionary are:

Isaiah 2:1–5—Turn swords into plowshares; walk in the light of the Lord.

Psalm 122—I was glad when they said, "Let us go to the house of the Lord!"

Romans 13:11–14—Salvation is near: wake up; live honorably; put on Jesus Christ.

Matthew 24:36–44—The Lord is coming; keep awake; no one knows the day or hour.

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ABOUT TODAY'S MUSIC

Today's opening voluntary is based on the German Advent chorale Wachet auf, ruft uns die Stimme ("Sleepers, Wake!" A Voice Astounds Us), which we also sing as our opening hymn this morning. Bach's setting originated in his Cantata 140 as a trio movement scored for violin obbligato, tenor, and continuo. The composer's own arrangement of this delightful piece for organ solo appeared in a collection of six such works published in 1748 by Johann Georg Schübler, which have long been known colloquially as the Schübler Chorales. • This morning's offertory voluntary comes from Bach's Orgelbüchlein (Little Organ Book). A setting of the well-known chorale Savior of the Nations, Come, its accompanying motif in the lower three (sometimes four) parts is derived from a suspirans in the melodic line, formed of a 16th-note rest — a "breath" — followed by three 16th notes and a longer fourth note. The mystery of the coming of the Savior is reflected by the somewhat hidden chorale melody over harmonies constantly reinventing themselves. communion voluntary is Georg Böhm's setting in chorale prelude form of Martin Luther's nine-verse paraphrase of the Lord's Prayer, which he completed in 1538. • Today's closing voluntary was most likely written during Bach's time in Weimar, and uses a steady theme four times in a row that can be easily recognized each time it reappears.

This morning's **choral introit** comes from a collection of *Seasonal Sentences* — short works for use on various occasions during the church year — by prolific British composer Richard Shephard, who serves in various administrative and liturgical capacities at England's York Minster Cathedral. • Today's choir anthem comes from a collection of airs for voice(s) and lute by Thomas Campion, published in 1613. Never weather-beaten sail is perhaps Campion's most famous work, and though his works were largely forgotten for some 200 years after his death — he is highly regarded today for the consistent high quality of his artful poetry wedded so beautifully and carefully to compelling music. T. S. Eliot called Campion, "except for Shakespeare . . . the most accomplished master of rhymed lyric of his time."
