


The Lord's Prayer

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🖥 ABOUT TODAY'S MUSIC

Organ music — Today's organ voluntaries come from the French organ tradition of the 20th century. André Fleury was a student of André Marchal (1894-1980), Louis Vierne (1870–1937), Eugène Gigout (1844–1925), and Marcel Dupré (1886–1971). During the course of his long career Fleury served as organist at Dijon Cathedral, Saint -Eustache Church in Paris, and Versailles Cathedral. His Vingt-quatre pièces (24 pieces) were composed during the years 1930-1933. Like similar collections by several other composers before and after him, the number 24 is significant, in part as an homage to the 24 preludes and fugues comprising Bach's Well-Tempered Clavier, and, like Bach, exploring in order all of the major and minor keys. This morning's opening and closing voluntaries are the first and last pieces in Fleury's collection, in the expected keys of C major and B minor, respectively. Other of Fleury's French organist predecessors and contemporaries who produced collections of 24 pieces like this include Louis Vierne, who composed two such sets of 24 pieces: 24 Pièces en style libre in 1912; and the larger 24 Pièces de fantasie, 1926-1927, Jean Langlais (1907-1991) Vingtquatre Pièces, 1934–1936, and Gaston Litaize (1909–1991) Vingt-quatre préludes liturgiques, 1953-1955.

Choral music — This morning's **introit** is by Peter Aston, who was a British composer and conductor, best known for writing a variety of high-quality liturgical choral works. Aston was active as a lay canon at Norwich Cathedral in England, and for fourteen years he was conductor of the Aldeburgh Festival Singers. Today's **anthem** is a setting of an old familiar text, set to new music in 1980 by American composer and organist David Hurd, Professor Emeritus of Sacred Music and Director of Chapel Music at General Theological Seminary in New York City.

Handbell music — Today's **offertory voluntary** is an arrangement by prolific American handbell composer Cathy Moklebust using the tune of this morning's closing hymn "When We Are Living." Moklebust is in wide demand throughout the country as a handbell festival clinician, and has composed over 250 bestselling arrangements and original works for handbells and tone chimes. This morning's offertory music is among her newest pieces, published in 2018.
