WORSHIP NOTES

Our preacher today is Dr. Samuel L. Adams, who joins us for the twenty-fourth annual Duerr Lecture Series. Dr. Adams is the Mary Jane and John F. McNair Chair in Biblical Studies at Union Presbyterian Seminary, Richmond, VA. A lifelong Presbyterian, Dr. Adams grew up in Atlanta, GA. He holds degrees from Yale University (Ph.D.) in Religious Studies, University of Chicago Divinity School (M.Div.), and Davidson College (B.A. *cum laude*).

Ordained in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) in 2001, he has served churches in Chicago, New Haven, and Richmond. Since joining the faculty of Union in 2006 he has been in demand as speaker in both academic and church settings, including having been the speaker for the 2012 Duerr Lecture Series. His publications include books, *Wisdom in Transition: Act and Consequence in Second Temple Instructions* (Leiden: Brill, 2008), *Social and Economic Life in the Second Temple Period* (Louisville: Westminster John Knox Press, July 2014), and the recently published *The Pursuit of Wisdom and Human Flourishing: Sirach and Its Contexts (A Virginia Conference)*, Editor with Greg Schmidt Goering and Matthew J. Goff (Brill, 2021). In addition he has published numerous articles, book reviews, and essays in *Interpretation* and *Journal for Preachers*, among others. Dr. Adams currently serves as Editor for the seminary's journal, *Interpretation: A Journal of Bible and Theology*. Other academic interests include apocalypticism, the Dead Sea Scrolls, the Bible and film, and the Bible and Christian theology in the context of American political discourse.

The 2021 series format has changed from previous years due to the pandemic which has curtailed gatherings. In order to comply with current cautions there will be one lecture held by live webinar. In his lecture, "Effective Speech in the Bible and in Our Age of Polarization," Dr. Adams will address how we talk to each other during a time of intense polarization. With the cable networks, social media feeds, and politicians of all stripes often trafficking in disagreement and discord, can we recover common ground? What does the Bible say about healthy speech? How can we advocate for our beliefs and at the same time be respectful of alternative viewpoints? Dr. Adams will examine the complex witness of Scripture on public discourse and how it might apply to us today. All sections of the biblical canon will be considered. The live webinar will be presented tonight at 7:00 p.m. Central Time. The lecture is free but registration is required. A link will be sent to registrants to access the webinar. The lecture series was established in 1998 in memory of Chris Duerr, with the purpose of bringing the best Reformed scholars and preachers to St. Philip and the wider community each year. Duerr was born and raised in Germany, growing up during the years of World War II. He came to the U.S. in 1950 in the first class of Fulbright Scholars from Germany, studying at Michigan State University. He also studied at the University of Hamburg, Germany, where he received the equivalent of a Master's Degree in political economics. He moved permanently to the States in 1968, becoming a naturalized citizen in 1973. He joined St. Philip in 1979 and later served as a ruling elder.

The Lecture Series was established through generous contributions made in Duerr's memory. This morning's **opening voluntary** is representative of a "golden age" of organ playing and building in North Germany during the late Baroque age. Buxtehude's *Praeludium in F major* falls into two sections: an improvisatory prelude and a spirited fugue, both of which display his singular rhythmic wit and contrapuntal virtuosity.

Today's **closing voluntary** is by English organist and composer Herbert Murrill, who studied at the Royal Academy of Music in London before becoming an organ scholar at Worcester College, Oxford. He was for a time music director for the Oxford Group at the Westminster Theatre, and subsequently worked in broadcasting at the BBC while also serving as professor of composition at the Royal Academy from 1933 until his death in 1952. Composed in 1949, his *Carillon* is a fanfare-toccata, an impressive piece of changing rhythms and meters. It remains the best known of Murrill's organ compositions.

Vocal Music

This morning's solo introit Come, Gracious Spirit is a setting of the beautiful English folk tune DANBY (No. 844 in the Glory to God hymnal), which first appeared in 1906 in The English Hymnal edited by Ralph Vaughan Williams. It is quite likely that Vaughan Williams himself collected this tune and named it for the place he heard it. Danby is a village in North Yorkshire, less than ten miles from the family home of his college friend Nicholas Gatty (1874-1946), with whom Vaughan Williams often spent summer holidays.* The tune is paired in today's service with a text written in 1720 by the English poet and clergyman Simon Browne, in an arrangement by American composer and organist Alfred Fedak, who has served since 1990 as Minister of Music and Arts at Westminster Presbyterian Church on Capitol Hill in Albany, New York.

Choral music sung this morning during **the peace** was composed by Keith Duke, who studied music at the Royal Academy of Music in London, and taught music in UK secondary schools for twenty-five years. Duke

held a number of appointments as organist and choir director in various English churches before meeting David Adam, the priest-poet of the Holy Island of Lindisfarne off the northeast coast of England. Immediately attracted to Adam's texts as a "whole new way of seeing my Christian faith," Duke has since worked closely with him on Lindisfarne to develop a style of song that is idiomatic to that holy place. *You, Lord, Are in This Place* is one of his contemplative settings for unaccompanied voices.

Today's **first anthem** is by Scottish composer Peter Nardone, who is also a freelance organist, conductor, and countertenor, having previously served as organist and director of music at Chelmsford and Worcester Cathedrals in England. His *I Give You a New Commandment* sets a simple tune in English over the traditional *Ubi caritas* chant sung by tenors and basses, all supported by a gentle organ accompaniment.

This morning's **second anthem** Come, my Way, my Truth, my Life is a setting by Harold Friedell of one of George Herbert's most beloved poems. Friedell was an American organist and music educator, who taught at both Juilliard and Union Seminary in New York City, and who served during the last two decades of this life as organist and master of the choir at St. Bartholomew's Church (Episcopal) in Midtown Manhattan. Friedell's music is marked by a noble simplicity of means, but powerful in its sentiments and direct setting of beautiful texts. Welsh-born George Herbert is recognized as one of the greatest British poets of the 17th century. Herbert was an Anglican priest, and left a very large body of poetry at his early death at the age of 39. All of his English poems (he also wrote poetry in Latin and Greek) are on religious themes, with a very large number considered to be masterpieces of English literature.
