DUERR LECTURE SERIES—Preaching this morning and speaker for the series, Dr. Rachel Baard is Assistant Professor of Theology and Ethics and Director of the Master of Arts in Public Theology Program at Union Presbyterian Seminary, Richmond, VA. She is a graduate of The University of Stellenbosch, South Africa (B.A., B.Th., and M.Th.) and Princeton Theological Seminary (Ph.D.), and she is in the ordination track with the Presbyterian Church (USA). Her first book *Sexism and Sin-Talk: Feminist Conversations on the Human Condition* (Westminster John Knox, 2019), which examines various perspectives on the doctrine of sin, was awarded the Andrew Murray/ Desmond Tutu Book Prize. In demand as a speaker and teacher, Dr. Baard has given numerous scholarly presentations at Princeton Theological Seminary, for the American Academy of Religion, and in South Africa for various academic and spiritual organizations.

The Duerr Lecture Series was established in memory of W. Chris Duerr, member and elder of St. Philip Presbyterian Church, Houston. As part of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) and the Reformed Tradition, the lectures focus upon speakers and subjects that will enhance Christian faith in light of that tradition. Challenging speakers are chosen from the fields of theology, Bible and preaching to inspire and equip congregants for deeper faith and service.

The ancient desert mystics believed that scripture was like a love letter written to us by God, and the meditative scriptural reflection known as *Lectio Divina* ("divine reading") assumes that God speaks to us intimately, God is already praying in us, and we'll experience a profound encounter with the heart of God, rather than an intellectual study of scripture. Keatan will guide the group through the four cycles of Lectio (read, reflect, respond, rest) every Monday morning at 9:00 -9:20am for the season of Lent. MUSIC NOTES

Organ Music

Today's **opening voluntary** is one of Bach's most grandiose organ preludes, set in the majestic key of C minor. Its powerful opening, with thick chord progressions alternating between the hands, yields eventually to a more flowing secondary idea. Over the course of the piece, Bach shows how both themes can be combined with each other in myriad ways.

Our **closing voluntary** treats the tune of today's opening hymn to an *organo pleno* fantasy, in which the tune appears in long notes at the bottom of the texture (in the pedal), with quicker figuration above, derived from each phrase of the melody. Its composer Johann Pachelbel set an example for generations of organists, including the young Sebastian Bach, in his skillful elaborations on Lutheran chorales.

Choral Music

This morning's **anthem** is by English composer, organist and music educator Derek Edward Healey, who retired from teaching in 1996 and settled in Brooklyn, New York. In addition to an opera written in 1977, Healey continues to compose orchestral and chamber pieces, organ music, and choral works, including a largescale *Requiem* for soprano soloist, chorus and orchestra completed in 2021. The anthem *Lord Jesus, Think on Me* was composed in 2011 in American shape-note style for four-part choir with organ accompaniment.

Today's **offertory anthem** – *Lord, for Thy Tender Mercy's Sake* – is a perennial favorite for the season of Lent in the United States, Canada, and the UK. Composer Richard Farrant was a member of the English Chapel Royal during a particularly tumultuous time in British history, and during his years he experienced the funeral of Edward VI, the coronation of Mary I, the funeral of Mary I, and the coronation of Elizabeth I. Though only a tiny number of his works still exist, he composed sacred music using both English and Latin texts, depending on who was on the British throne.
