



WORSHIP NOTES

To receive communion today, please come forward via the center aisle, for a piece of bread. The bread may be dipped in the chalice of grape juice and consumed or you may take a small cup of grape juice from the tray. You may return to your pew via the side aisles. GLuten-free bread is available. Just ask the servers as you come forward. Those with mobility challenges may receive communion in their seats. Just signaL the servers. Because the table of Jesus Christ is open to all, everyone is welcome to receive communion today.

An additional offering is received when communion is celebrated. Our communion offering will be for Kids Against Hunger. Kids Against Hunger is an organization familiar to many at St. Philip whose families have participated in the packaging of a highly nutritious, vitamin-fortified soy-rice casserole at the church with other volunteers from within the congregation and from the greater Houston community. KAH distributes those meals to starving children and their families in 70 countries through partnerships with humanitarian organizations worldwide. Although the pandemic halted packing sessions at the church, the Mission Committee is committed to revitalizing those sessions and St. Philip's relationship with this worthy organization. You may also make a secure contribution through MyStPhilip or by sending a check to the church office, with "Communion Offering" in the memo line.

Today's worship service includes traditional Negro Spiritual music. The Black composers of this music are unknown to history and therefore unable to receive royalties directed to their estates for the use of their songs. To remedy this inequity, a fund has been created and approved by the Session where we will collect voluntary "royalties" for using this music. Anyone may donate to the fund by going to the saintphilip.net homepage and selecting Make a Contribution, then selecting Negro Spirituals as the fund. (For temporary administrative reasons only, this fund displays as Negro Spirituals/UNICEF.) Members can also access this page on the MyStPhilip app (also linked to from the homepage). You may also contribute by writing a check with Negro Spirituals in the memo line and placing it in the offering plate or mailing it to the church office. This small gesture of reparation seeks to help heal the long history of injury to Black persons. Contributions received over the course of the year will be donated annually to a local organization supporting Black musical traditions.

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MUSIC NOTES

Organ Music

American composer and organist Emma Lou Diemer taught for many years at the University of California at Santa Barbara. A prolific composer of keyboard music and hymn settings especially, she is fond of updating familiar hymn melodies in subtly unconventional ways. Today's opening voluntary rescores two well-known American hymn tunes: HOLY MANNA ("God, Who Stretched the Spangled Heavens") and CONVERSE ("What a Friend We Have in Jesus"). Diemer treats the former tune in a flowing, gentle dance, while grafting the latter onto a bossa-nova like rhythmic pattern. Our closing voluntary sets a well-known German chorale melody ("How Brightly Shines the Morning Star") to a lively trio texture. Its composer Johann Pachelbel, was one of the leading Lutheran church musicians of the era immediately preceding that of J. S. Bach.

Choral Music

This morning's **introit** is by English composer, conductor and organist Eric Thiman, who published some 1,300 works during his lifetime, including many anthems, carols and canticles for church choirs. Much of Thiman's choral and organ music was written for Nonconformist (i.e., non-Anglican) churches, and Thiman himself was a Congregationalist by birth. *I Was Glad* is No. 7 of 24 *Introits*, published in 1961. Like much of his music, it shows a particularly strong affinity for traditional harmony used to striking and new effect. Thiman was a master of shortform pieces, as evidenced here in just 17 measures of music for four-part choir and organ.

Today's **offertory anthem** is by British composer Philip Stopford, who began his musical life as a chorister at Westminster Abbey, being trained under the direction of both Simon Preston and Martin Neary. He later held positions at Truro Cathedral, Chester Cathedral, and Can-

terbury Cathedral, and he is now Director of Music at Christ Church (Episcopal) in Bronxville, New York, just outside New York City. His many compositions of choral music are noted for their relatively simple but highly evocative settings of traditional Latin and English prayers and hymns. *O Be Joyful* was composed in 2007.

This morning's **communion anthem** is an arrangement by John Wesley Work III of the African American spiritual *This Little Light of Mine*. Published in 1943, it is one of a large number of spirituals and folk songs arranged by Work, who, like his father and grandfather, was long associated with Fisk University in Nashville and its renowned Fisk Jubilee Singers. Work received his Bachelor of Arts degree in 1923 from Fisk University, followed by studies in New York City at the Institute of Musical Art (now The Juilliard School), and earning a Master of Music degree from Columbia University, writing his thesis on African American songs. Work would pursue additional research on that subject for the rest of his life.

Work received a Bachelor of Music degree from Yale University in 1933, and in 1940 his Master's thesis was published as *American Negro Songs and Spirituals: A Comprehensive Collection of 230 Folk Songs, Religious and Secular.* His arrangement of *This Little Light of Mine* heard this morning features the slower, more reflective version of this well-loved spiritual, and is set for four-part choir and soloist. John Wesley Work III died on May 17, 1967 in Nashville, Tennessee. In 2007 his album *John Work III: Recording Black Culture*, received a Grammy Award forty years after his death.




