



📕 WORSHIP NOTES

Communion today is served by passing trays of bread and juice through the pews. You may eat and drink as you receive the elements. All the bread is gluten-free. Because the table of Jesus Christ is open to all, everyone is welcome to receive communion today.

An additional offering is received when communion is celebrated. Gifts brought forward during today's final hymn support the Souper Bowl of Caring. The youth of St. Philip have designated that this go to Interfaith Ministries Meals on Wheels.

Today's readings from the Revised Common Lectionary are:

- Micah 6:1-8-What does the Lord require? Justice, kindness, and humility.
- Psalm 15—Those who do what is right live in the presence of God.
- 1 Corinthians 1:18-31-The foolishness of the cross shames the wisdom of the world.
- Matthew 5:1–12—Jesus begins his Sermon on the Mount with the Beatitudes.

MUSIC NOTES

Organ music — Today's **organ voluntaries** are representative of a "golden age" of organ playing and building in both North Germany and France during the late Baroque age. Buxtehude's F-major Praeludium falls into two sections: an improvisatory prelude and a spirited fugue, both of which display his singular rhythmic wit and contrapuntal virtuosity. Louis-Antoine Dornel, one of the most popular Parisian composers of his day, left a single published volume of organ works (1756) with multiple suites. These suites feature movements that display the tonal characteristics of the French Baroque organ, from delicate flute and "mutation" stops (which play harmonic partials) to pungent reeds, all within the frame of short pieces whose titles ("Duo," "Fugue," "Trio") indicate both voicing and particular stop combinations.

Choral and vocal music — This morning's **introit** is by British composer Philip Wilby, who is Professor Emeritus in the School of Music at the University of Leeds, where he taught composition and conducting, and directed the Leeds University Liturgical Choir. His setting of *God Be in My Head* was published in 1989, and is rather unique in that it can be sung by virtually any combination of voices, with or without accompaniment. It is presented this morning in its SATB choir version with organ. • Today's **anthem** is by English organist, conductor, and composer Malcolm Archer, who served as cathedral director of music at Norwich, Bristol, Wells, and St. Paul's London before assuming his present position as director of chapel music at Winchester College. • The **offertory solo** comes from Leonard Bernstein's MASS, commissioned by Jacqueline Kennedy and composed in 1971 for the inauguration of the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington, DC.
