Do you believe in the Holy Spirit?


I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

Our cover image is the butterfly that sits on the front lawn of the church. The butterfly, designed by Micah Meyers, came to us in support of the ministry of Newspring.


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ABOUT TODAY'S MUSIC

Organ music — Today's **opening voluntary** is the first movement of a concerto from an important London contemporary of Handel. A first-rate violinist and organist, John Stanley was blessed with a prodigious musical memory, something that came in handy in his case, since a childhood accident left him nearly blind for the rest of his life. His concertos, scored for organ and string ensemble, can be realized quite effectively on organ alone, as we hear this morning.

Choral music — This morning's anthem is sung by the sopranos and altos of the choir. Will Todd's Lighting the Way was "written for the 'Lighting the Way Festival' in Durham Cathedral in 2000, [and it was] sung by thousands of North East school children as part of their visits to the Cathedral over the course of several weeks. It was written with the intention of being easy to pick up, and this has made it a popular worship song, beyond the context of the original commission." (quote by Will Todd © 2006) • The offertory anthem comes from Charles Villiers Stanford's last major setting of the morning, communion, and evening canticles for the English church, published as Op. 115 in 1909. Though Stanford has gained universal recognition as a composer of church music, it was primarily in his capacity as teacher of composition at the Royal College of Music from 1883 that he made his most important contributions to the heritage of English church music. Three of his more illustrious pupils were Charles Wood, Herbert Howells and Ralph Vaughan Williams. Stanford was highly cultured, widely travelled and greatly respected in academic circles, and as a composer he was prolific in all genres, both sacred and secular. Stanford considered his Magnificat and Nunc dimittis in C (we hear the Nunc dimittis this morning) to be his finest settings of these canticles, and they have an ethereal beauty and air of simplicity which sets them apart from his other services.
