
Lift High the Cross







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WORSHIP NOTES

Communion today is received by intinction. Please come forward via the center aisle, take a piece of bread, and dip it into the chalice of grape juice. All the bread is glutenfree. The station closest to the windows offers individual cups of juice. The adjacent basket is for the used cups. Persons with difficulty coming forward may receive communion in their seats by signaling the servers. Because the table of Jesus Christ is open to all, everyone is welcome to receive communion today.

An additional offering is received when communion is celebrated. Gifts brought forward during today's final hymn support Plant It Forward.

Throughout Lent, we are placing the prayers of our hearts on the sanctuary tree. The paper hearts in the pews may be used to record your prayers. Hearts may be placed in the offering plate or brought to the communion table at the end of the service.

Today's readings from the Revised Common Lectionary are:

- Genesis 2:15–17; 3:1–7—The man and woman disobey God, eating forbidden fruit.
- Psalm 32—My sin tormented me; but when I confessed, God forgave me.
- Romans 5:12–19—Sin and death came from Adam; grace and life come from Christ.
- Matthew 4:1–11—Jesus spends forty days in the wilderness and is tested by the devil.

MUSIC NOTES

Organ music — This morning's **opening voluntary** is unique in all of Bach's works, so much so that some scholars have questioned whether it is indeed by Bach at all. Its straightforward setting of the chorale melody in the right hand is supported by an unwavering heartbeat of repeated chords in the left hand and pedal, yielding a haunting beauty that is hard to match anywhere else in the literature for the organ. • Today's **closing voluntary** comes from Marcel Dupré's *Le Tombeau de Titelouze*, containing sixteen pieces in all based on plainsong hymns. *Placare Christe servulis* (O Christ, forgive your servants) is the final work in the volume, treating the hymn melody in the form of a brilliant toccata in D major.

Choral and vocal music — Today's **choir anthem** is a perennial favorite for the season of Lent in the United States, Canada, and the UK. Richard Farrant was a member of the English Chapel Royal during a particularly tumultuous time in British history, and during his years he experienced the funeral of Edward VI, the coronation of Mary I, the funeral of Mary I, and the coronation of Elizabeth I. Though only a tiny number of his works still exist, he composed sacred music using both English and Latin texts (probably depending on who was on the throne!). Today's offertory solo features a prayer text by the English poet David Adam, retired Anglican priest and former rector of the Holy Island of Lindisfarne off the northern east coast of England (just south of the border with Scotland), the ancient and still-important center of Celtic Christianity. Adam is the author of several books collecting meditations, prayers, and art in the Celtic tradition. The musical setting of his "Thou Art God" is by contemporary English composer, organist, and conductor Lionel Bourne. • This morning's communion anthem is a setting of one of George Herbert's most beloved poems by Harold Friedell. Friedell was an American organist and music educator, who taught at both Julliard and Union Seminary in New York City, and who served during the last two decades of this life as Organist and Master of the Choir at St. Bartholomew's Church (Episcopal) in Midtown Manhattan. Friedell's music is marked by a noble simplicity of means, but powerful in its sentiments and direct setting of beautiful texts. Welsh-born George Herbert is recognized as one of the greatest British poets of the 17th century. Herbert was an Anglican priest, and left a very large body of poetry at his early death at the age of only 39. All of his English poems (he also wrote poetry in Latin and Greek) are on religious themes, with a very large number considered to be masterpieces of English literature.
