

MUSIC NOTES

Organ Music

Today's **opening voluntary** comes from one of the finest organists of the generation preceding that of J. S. Bach: Georg Böhm, with whom the young Bach studied at St Michael's School in Lüneburg. Böhm's Praeludium in C major comprises an exuberant introduction with some fancy footwork plus a short fugue on a fanfare-like theme. A joyful spirit likewise permeates today's closing voluntary: Handel's La Réjouissance ("The Rejoicing"), part of a larger suite of Music for the Royal Fireworks. The latter work, created in 1749 for an outdoor celebration of the Treaty of Aix-la-Chapelle (which put an end to the War of the Austrian Succession), was originally scored for a large ensemble of wind instruments. It has since been transcribed countless times for other instruments, including organ.

Choral Music

This morning's **introit** is a festive setting of words from 1 Corinthians 5, reflecting the celebration of Christ's resurrection as our Christian Passover. *Christ Our Passover* was composed for unaccompanied fourpart choir by British/Canadian composer Healey Willan, who was one of the most prolific and highly regarded church music composers of the 20th century. Willan was associated with the Church of St. Mary Magdalene (Anglican Church of Canada) in Toronto for nearly 50 years, and many of his choral works were written for the choir there, which remains to this day among the finest all-volunteer choirs in North America.

Today's **first anthem** features a text originally written in German by Michael Weisse, who was a contemporary of Martin Luther. *Christ the Lord Is Risen Again* was translated into English along with countless other German texts by 19th-century English hymnwriter and educator Catherine Winkworth. John Rutter's original setting of this popular Easter hymn is resplendent and celebratory, with frequent meter changes that give a fresh feel to these historic words.

In addition to this morning's opening hymn, today's offertory anthem features another of Charles Wesley's well-known Easter texts. This morning's choral setting of Christ the Lord Is Risen Today was composed by Toronto-based Canadian composer and conductor Eleanor Daley, who received her Bachelor of Music degree in organ performance from Queen's University in Kingston, Ontario and holds diplomas in piano and organ from the Royal Conservatory of Music, Toronto and Trinity College, England. She has been the Director of Music at Fairlawn Heights United Church in Toronto, Ontario since 1982. A prolific composer, Daley has a remarkable gift for melody, and her works are most notable for their sensitive interweaving of text and music. She was appointed to the Order of Canada in 2022 "for her contributions to Canadian music and choral culture as a renowned composer and accompanist."

Philip or not. You'll get to know your church home better, and there will be yummy treats to enjoy!




The St. Philip office will be closed Monday, April 10 in observance of Easter.

In 1968 Easter fell ten days after the assassination of Martin Luther King Jr., and this text was written to express an Easter hope while mindful of that terrible event. Buoyed by a triple-arched tune, it affirms the presence of a wounded, risen Christ with all who suffer.



This Easter text, first in French and later in English, was written to fit the music, a chorus created for Handel's oratorio *Joshua* and moved to *Judas Maccabeus* in 1751. It grew widely popular following its use at the First Assembly of the World Council of Churches in 1948.
