

This Cross



Today's readings from the Revised Common Lectionary are:

Liturgy of the Palms

- Luke 19:28–40—Jesus enters Jerusalem on a colt; the disciples praise God with joy.
- Psalm 118:1–2, 19–29—Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord.

Liturgy of the Passion

- Isaiah 50:4–9a—The Lord God helps me; who will declare me guilty?
- Psalm 31:9–16—Be gracious, Lord; my enemies assail me; my life is in your hand.
- Philippians 2:5–11—Seek the mind of Christ, who was humble, but exalted by God.
- Luke 22:14-23:56-After the Passover meal, Jesus is betrayed, tried, and crucified.
- or Luke 23:1-49 [abbreviated reading] Jesus is tried and crucified.

MUSIC NOTES

11:00 a.m. organ music — German composer Paul Hindemith's neoclassical musical language owes much to the legacy of Johann Sebastian Bach. A talented violinist and violist, he began composing in earnest after the First World War and embraced many genres, from film music to opera. His forward-looking musical aesthetic made emigration necessary during the 1930s; he worked for several years in Turkey before settling in the US, where he taught for many years at Yale University. His organ works include three sonatas, each of which follows a different muse. Sonata II begins with a movement marked *Lebhaft* (Lively) that begins as a triumphal procession. Contrasting musical ideas, from darkly humorous to the solemn, provide interesting contrast before a return of the opening material in this movement, which serves as today's **opening voluntary**. • Today's **closing voluntary** is Bach's setting of a sixteenth-century Passion chorale traditionally sung on Good Friday, from his *Orgelbüchlein* (Little Organ Book). Its drooping figuration and many dissonances convey the anguish of the hymn text, whose first line ("As Jesus hung upon the Cross") introduces the catalog of ills visited upon Jesus during his crucifixion.

11:00 a.m. choral and solo music — This morning's **anthem** is by British composer Philip Wilby, who is Professor Emeritus in the School of Music at the University of Leeds, where he taught composition and conducting, and directed the Leeds University Liturgical Choir. *Wondrous Cross* is Wilby's 2005 setting of the famous 1707 hymn text "When I survey the wondrous cross" by Isaac Watts. In Wilby's gentle setting, the first two verses are sung in unison over a gentle rhythmic ostinato accompaniment. The third verse features four-part harmony and a slightly faster tempo, falling back into a gentle stroll for verse four and brought to a quiet close by a solo soprano with the ostinato accompaniment continuing underneath. • Today's **offertory solo** is also focused on the Cross, with a text by an anonymous author originally featured during a Good Friday sermon. Currently Cantor (director of music and organist) at Trinity Lutheran Church in Worcester, Massachusetts, composer Mark Mummert was Director of Worship at Christ the King Lutheran Church here in Houston from 2008 to 2015.

Last Sunday, April 7, for the Communion music, *Ich habe genug*, by J. S. Bach, soprano Julia Fox and organist Matthew Dirst were joined by flutist Margaret Fair. Regrettably, Margaret's name was left out of the list of participating musicians and a number of people have asked who had played the flute so beautifully.
