

WORSHIP NOTES

To receive communion today, please come forward via the center aisle, for a piece of bread. The bread may be dipped in the chalice of grape juice and consumed or you may take a small cup of grape juice from the tray. You may return to your pew via the side aisles. Gluten-free bread is available, just ask the servers as you come forward. Those with mobility challenges may receive communion in their seats, just signal the servers. Because the table of Jesus Christ is open to all, everyone is welcome to receive communion today.

An additional offering is received when communion is celebrated. Our communion offering this month supports the Pentecost Offering of the Presbyterian Church (USA). A gift to the Pentecost Offering helps the church encourage, develop, and support its young people, and also address the needs of at-risk children. 40% of the Pentecost offering will remain local and benefit the Hope and Healing Center and Institute. MUSIC NOTES

Organ Music

English composer and organist William Boyce rose to the prestigious post of Master of the King's Musick in 1757. His compositional achievements include works for royal occasions, choral and organ music, and a considerable amount of theatrical music. All his organ pieces adopt the format of the classic "English voluntary," which is to say a piece in two contrasting sections, one slow and the other fast. His *Voluntary in C Major*, today's **opening voluntary**, includes as its final section section a lively trumpet tune.

Today's closing voluntary comes from a grand-pupil of Johann Sebastian Bach, via one of the latter's last students, Johann Christian Kittel. Karl Gottlieb Umbreit spent his life in his home town of Erfurt, where he taught, played the organ, and composed the occasional piece of music. His C-major Fantasia mingles CPE Bach's witty weirdness with the more romantic ethos of a Felix Mendelssohn, producing an unpredictable work that exemplifies this transitional period in German organ music.

Choral Music

Today's **offertory anthem** sets words from the Book of Revelation and the Gospel of John that inspired the famous 1851 painting pictured to the right — also called *The Light of the World* — by William Holman Hunt (1827–1910). Andrew Carter's musical setting was commissioned by First Presbyterian Church in Galesburg, Illinois for the installation of their pastor in 1988. Andrew Carter began his musical career as a bass singer in the York Minster Choir, and later founded the Chapter House Choir at York Minster, which he directed for seventeen years. Long associated with Oxford University Press, Carter has composed numerous sacred choral works for church and cathedral choirs, as well as for choirs with orchestra.



The Light of the World | 1851 William Holman Hunt (1827–1910)


Mirroring today's gospel reading and sermon hymn, the **communion anthem** is another setting of one of George Herbert's most beloved poems. Composer Harold Friedell was an American organist and music educator, who taught at both Julliard and Union Seminary in New York City, and who served during the last two decades of this life as Organist and Master of the Choir at St. Bartholomew's Church (Episcopal) in Midtown Manhattan. Friedell's music is marked by a noble simplicity of means, but powerful in its sentiments and direct setting of beautiful texts. Welsh-born George Herbert is recognized as one of the greatest British poets of the 17th century. Herbert was an Anglican priest, and left a very large body of poetry at his early death at the age of only 39. All of his English poems (he also wrote poetry in Latin and Greek) are on religious themes, with a very large number considered to be masterpieces of English literature.


