

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MUSIC NOTES

Organ Music

Gaetano Valeri was for many years organist at the Padova Cathedral. Active in the opera house as well as the church, he left a significant body of work in virtually all genres of his era. His *Sonata in E-flat* embodies its musical values, with hummable tunes and operatic filigree in the upper voice.

Girolamo Frescobaldi, as organist of St. Peter's in Rome, enjoyed great prominence in the early seventeenth century for his keyboard music especially, which ranges from avant-garde toccatas to old-fashioned counterpoint. His dance-like setting of the standard "Bergamasca" harmonic progression comprises multiple sections of inspired and eminently tuneful polyphony.

André Campra served until 1700 as a church musician at various French cathedrals, including Notre Dame in Paris. For the next twenty years he was the leading composer of French opera, only to abandon it two decades later for the exclusive composition of sacred music. His *Rigaudon*, excerpted from a dance sequence in one of his theatrical works, employs the standard French format of the rondeau, in which a repeating refrain alternates with other material.

Choral Music

Today's anthem is a setting of the beautiful Welsh folk tune SUO GÂN, traditionally sung in Wales as a children's lullaby. Holy Spirit, Hope and Healer was arranged by American composer John Carter, who has enjoyed a long and productive writing career creating many choral compositions, both sacred and secular, over sixty collections of piano works including settings of hymns and carols, and more recently original compositions for piano. Carter taught music in Ohio public schools and was on the faculty at Morehead State University in Kentucky, in addition to holding music positions in Presbyterian, Methodist, American Baptist, and United Church of Christ congregations. Like this morning's anthem, many of his choral works have been written in collaboration with his wife, lyricist Mary Kay Beall, working together on numerous commissioned choral works for schools, churches and community choral groups. Carter holds a Bachelor of Music degree from Trinity University in San Antonio and a Master of Music degree from Peabody College in Nashville.

SUNDAY WORSHIP SCHEDULE

The session has voted to continue with a single service on Sundays at 11 a.m., at least through the summer.



Shaped by its traditional Jewish tune, this selection of English stanzas conveys the essence of the *Yigdal*, a canticle based on a medieval Hebrew statement of faith about the nature of God and often used in synagogue worship, alternately chanted by cantor and congregation.

This text was the winning entry in a hymnwriting competition seeking new texts dealing with poverty and homelessness, but as the stanza sung at the beginning and end of the hymn makes clear, such specific ministries grow out of an understanding of the church as love in action.

Sometimes this prolific 19th-century hymnwriter wrote texts for others to set, and sometimes she created words for tunes others had composed. This text was of the second kind, and the resulting close fit between words and music has made them both popular and inseparable.
