



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#### **Organ Music**

This morning's **organ voluntaries** comprise the the outer movements of a concerto by an important London contemporary of Handel. A first-rate violinist and organist, John Stanley was blessed with a prodigious musical memory, something that came in handy in his case especially since a childhood accident left him nearly blind for the rest of his life. His concertos, scored for organ and string ensemble, can be realized quite effectively on organ alone.

Today's contemplative **introit** is by English composer Margaret Rizza, who, since turning to composition in 1997, has written a large body of sacred works for voices and instruments. Much of Rizza's music is in the Taizé-like style of this morning's *Calm Me, Lord,* but she has also written a significant number of larger works for choir, organ and instruments. Still active as a composer in her early 90s, Rizza came to composition following a long career as an opera singer spanning some 25 years under the name Margaret Lensky, working with conductors such as Britten, Stravinsky and Bernstein. Between her years on the opera stage and her compositional career, she taught singing from 1977 to 1994 at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama in London.

Today's **anthem** is an arrangement of a contemporary praise and worship song by David J. Evans. *Be Still for* 

the Presence of the Lord is heard this morning in a more traditional setting by English composer Richard Shephard for soprano, alto and bass voices with organ accompaniment. Before his death in February of this year, Shephard served for many decades in various administrative and liturgical capacities at England's York Minster Cathedral, while also composing a large body of accessible choral music for the church.

This morning's quiet **choral benediction** is by British composer John Rutter, who has enjoyed a very long and distinguished career writing and conducting mostly sacred choral music. *A Gaelic Blessing* was originally composed for SATB voices and organ, commissioned by the choir of First United Methodist Church in Omaha, Nebraska. First published in 1978, the piece now exists in several versions for different configurations of singers, perhaps owing to its popularity over the last many decades. The version heard at the end of today's service is perhaps the simplest and most immediate, for mostly unison voices (with one short stretch for singers in two parts) and organ accompaniment.
