

Worship Notes

The quote in the preparation for worship is from theologian James H. Cone. Professor James H. Cone, known as the founder of black liberation theology, was the Bill and Judith Moyers Distinguished Professor of Systematic Theology at Union Theological Seminary. He attended Shorter College (1954-56) and held a B.A. degree from Philander Smith College (1958). In 1961, he received a Master of Divinity degree from Garrett Theological Seminary and later earned an M.A. (1963) and Ph.D. (1965) from Northwestern University. Dr. Cone was an ordained minister in the African Methodist Episcopal Church. Dr. Cone was best known for his ground-breaking works, Black Theology & Black Power (1969) and A Black Theology of Liberation (1970); he was also the author of the highly acclaimed God of the Oppressed (1975), and of Martin & Malcolm & America: A Dream or a Nightmare? (1991). His 2012 book, The Cross and the Lynching Tree, received the 2012 Nautilus Silver Award in Religion/Spirituality-Western Traditions. It was an Amazon.com #1 best seller in religion in February 2012. Naming it one of the top religion books of 2011, Huffington Post editors said: "One of the great theologians of the late 20th century, Cone forces us to look hard at suffering, oppression and, ultimately, redemption." In 2018 Cone earned the Grawemeyer Award in Religion, jointly awarded by Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary and the University of Louisville for this book. Cone completed his final book, a memoir, just a few months before his passing. Said I Wasn't Gonna Tell Nobody was published in 2018. (biography from Union Seminary)

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📕 Music Notes

Organ Music

For the organ Felix Mendelssohn wrote six multimovement sonatas, one of which serves as the source for today's **opening** and **closing voluntaries**. Classically inspired examples of the genre, these sonatas were partly a response to the demand for such works in England, where Mendelssohn was widely celebrated as an organ virtuoso. The *Sonata in* D major, Op. 65/5 includes a chorale-like introduction, an alluring slow movement reminiscent of his "Songs without Words" for piano, and a rousing closing movement in sonata-allegro form.

Choral Music

This morning's **introit** is a setting by British organist Noel Rawsthorne of a prayer traditionally attributed to St. Patrick of Ireland. Rawsthorne was Organist of Liverpool Anglican Cathedral from 1955 to 1980, and composed a large body of sacred choral and organ works. *Christ Be with Me* was published in 2006, and features a simple but compelling melody for singers in unison, crowned with a lovely descant at the end.

Today's **anthem** sets a powerful "healing" text by hymn-writer and Church of Scotland minister John L. Bell, who has long been associated with the island Iona Community in Scotland. Bell himself paired the text of *We Cannot Measure How You Heal* with the traditional Scottish tune YE BANKS AND BRAES, heard this morning in a lilting arrangement from 2003 by British composer, organist and choir trainer Malcolm Archer. Before his retirement in 2017, Archer served with great distinction at cathedrals in Norwich, Bristol, Wells, and St. Paul's Cathedral in London, and finally as Director of Chapel Music at Winchester College.

This morning's **choral benediction** is another traditional prayer text, here taken from the *Sarum Primer* of 1514, which was a book of prayers and worship resources collected by the clergy at Salisbury Cathedral in England. "Sarum" is the abbreviation for *Sarisburium*, the Latin word for Salisbury. The text of *God Be in My Head* is a favorite among composers for its simplicity and directness. The setting heard this morning is by English composer Cecil Armstrong Gibbs, who was a student of Ralph Vaughan Williams and Adrian Boult. Gibbs devoted much of his musical career to the amateur choral and festival movements in Britain, and was a prolific composer of choral music and songs.
