

MUSIC NOTES

Organ Music

Today's organ voluntaries both come from The Art of Fugue, a collection Bach began around 1740 and didn't quite finish by his death in 1750. The idea for a grand compendium of the fugal art seems to have been in Bach's mind since his youth, when he made careful study of the most intricate contrapuntal works of several venerable predecessors. Engraved in open score, following the example of Bach's own fair copy from the mid-1740s, The Art of Fugue was intended to serve keyboard players, though performance by any instruments capable of realizing multiple layers of counterpoint is possible. At the opening of our service, we hear the first of fourteen fugues in the volume; and at the close, the first of four canons based on the same principal theme.

Choral Music

This morning's **introit** is by English composer, conductor and organist Eric Thiman, who published some 1,300 works during his lifetime, including many anthems, carols and canticles for church choirs. Much of Thiman's choral and organ music was written for Nonconformist (i.e., non-Anglican) churches, and Thiman himself was a Congregationalist by birth. *I Was Glad* is No. 7 of

24 Introits, published in 1961. Like much of his music, it shows a particularly strong affinity for traditional harmony used to striking and new effect. Thiman was a master of short-form pieces, as evidenced here in just 17 measures of music for four-part choir and organ.

The **motet** following today's gospel reading comes from William Byrd's monumental *Gradualia*, a collection of 109 choral works for use throughout the church year, published in two volumes in 1605 and 1607. The four-part *Ego sum panis vivus* appears in the second volume, and shows Byrd's phenomenal creativity and skill in its lively portrayal of Christ's words from this morning's gospel, "I am the living bread that came down from heaven. Whoever eats of this bread will live forever." Notice, for example, the quickening rhythms at the word "vivus" [living], and the falling melodic lines at "descendit" [descended, or came down]. The motet concludes in a cascade of exuberant alleluias.


