



MUSIC NOTES

Organ Music

Today's organ voluntaries are both settings of German chorales by Johann Ludwig Krebs, who studied both organ and composition with J. S. Bach. Krebs's compositions reflect that tutelage on multiple levels, while inching stylistically towards the more melody-dominated music of the mid 18th century. The chorales *Herr Gott, dich loben alle wir* ("Lord God, we praise you") and *Nun freut euch, lieben Christen g'mein* ("Dear Christians, one and all, rejoice") both come from Martin Luther himself. The former, treated expansively in fantasia style by Krebs, is a German versification of the *Te Deum*, a venerable hymn of praise from the Roman Catholic tradition. The latter, created anew by Luther to celebrate the gift of salvation, became a veritable folk song of the Reformation.

Choral Music

This morning's **introit** is by English composer, conductor and organist Eric Thiman, who published some 1,300 works during his lifetime, including many anthems, carols and canticles for church choirs. Much of Thiman's choral and organ music was written for Nonconformist (i.e., non-Anglican) churches, and Thiman himself was a Congregationalist by birth. *I Was Glad* is No. 7 of 24 *In*-

troits, published in 1961. Like much of his music, it shows a particularly strong affinity for traditional harmony used to striking and new effect. Thiman was a master of short-form pieces, as evidenced here in just 17 measures of music for four-part choir and organ.

Today's **first anthem** by Peter Aston is a jubilant setting of familiar verses from Psalm 96 for choir with organ accompaniment, published in 1978. Aston was a British composer and conductor, best known for writing a variety of liturgical choral works, and active as a lay canon at Norwich Cathedral in England. In addition, he was for fourteen years conductor of the Aldeburgh Festival Singers.

The **offertory anthem** was written by British composer Martin Shaw for the 1923 Annual Festival of the Rochester Diocesan Church Choirs Association in Kent, England. Shaw's published works include over 300 songs, hymns, carols, oratorios, numerous instrumental works, and four operas. Written for four-part choir and organ, for 100 years Shaw's joyous *With a Voice of Singing* has remained a favorite choral classic.



I Give Electronically—in response to parents' hopes that their children might be able to see their ongoing commitment to St. Philip and with the intent to better represent the totality of our giving as a congregation, we have available in the pews giving cards that can be placed in the offering plate by our electronic givers.





Although this ancient text has often been used at church dedications, the first stanza clearly refers to the people of God and the second to the place where they meet. The stately and soaring tune is aptly named for the edifice where the composer served as organist and is buried.



This communion text calls attention to the inherent sacramental nature of all meals and the communal dimensions of all human interaction. The tune, originally composed for an anthem setting of this text, honors the institution where the composer was trained and later taught.



A North American Congregational minister wrote this text as a Christian expansion of the root sense of "good-bye": God be [with] ye/you. The tune, named for a cousin, was composed by one of the few 20th-century British composers to make a major contribution to hymnody.
