

MUSIC NOTES

Organ Music

Welsh composer William Mathias was one of the leading lights of British church music for many years. His compositions include numerous anthems sung by the choir here at St. Philip over the years, including a spirited setting of *Lift Up Your Heads* and *Let the People Praise Thee, O God*. Among his numerous organ works is this morning's *Carillon* whose varying textures—from gentle tintinnabulations to clangorous ostinatos—remind us of the diverse kinds of sounds of church bells but via various sonorities of the organ.

Handbell Music

This morning's instrumental introit is a brief hymn-tune arrangement by Indianapolis-based composer Jason Krug, who has written over 400 handbell compositions, as well as other works for piano, organ, choir, and string orchestra. Krug's setting of *To God Be the Glory* is written for a small handbell ensemble of just six ringers.

Choral Music

Today's **first anthem** is by American composer and conductor Z. Randall Stroope, whose composition teachers included Cecil Effinger and Normand Lockwood, both students of the renowned French teacher/composer Nadia Boulanger, who was herself a student of Gabriel Fauré. That lineage is evident in Stroope's profound setting of its even more profound text by George Herbert. Herbert's poetry, like that of his contemporary, John Donne, is a field of contest in which the poet grapples with God,

confronting his own sin and doubt. But Herbert's verse also radiates joy and gratitude. *The Call* is an affirmation of faith so powerful it bursts the bounds of its plain language, welling up and spilling over with emotion.* Composed in 2006, Z. Randall Stroope's deeply affecting musical setting of Herbert's poem is written for four-part choir and organ.

This morning's **second anthem** is a new work by American composer Mark A. Miller, based on the well-known African American spiritual of similar title. *God's Got the Whole World* was written in 2020 and dedicated to Ken Dake and the Marble Collegiate Church Sanctuary Choir in New York City, and is composed for unaccompanied four-part choir with some divisi in up to seven parts. Its text is freely adapted from the original spiritual, and its music hints at the original without ever directly quoting it. The dreamlike result is moving and prayerful and new in every way. A graduate of The Juilliard School (M.Mus. in Organ Performance) and Yale University (B.A. Music), Mark A. Miller has been a Lecturer in Sacred Music at Yale University's Institute of Sacred Music and Divinity School since 2006. He also serves as Professor of Church Music, Director of Chapel, and Composer in Residence at Drew University in Madison New Jersey, and Minister of Music at Christ Church (UCC & American Baptist) in Summit, New Jersey. In 2017 he was appointed to serve on the Hymnal Revision Committee of the United Methodist Church, his home denomination.


