

ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

Today's organ voluntaries come from two modernist German composers, both of whom were strongly affected by the revival of interest in Baroque music during their lifetimes. Each borrowed textures and genres from the 18th century in their own compositions while cultivating their own contemporary style. Hugo Distler wrote his Trio Sonata in 1939 with his own house organ in mind. Following the model of Bach's trio sonatas, Distler infused this trio texture with counterpoint that is by turns angular and elegant, cheerful and melancholy. Its first movement, today's opening voluntary, features two melodic lines that exchange places in the texture halfway through. A German chorale tune animates Helmut Walcha's Nun danket all und bringet Ehr ("We give thanks and bring praise"), this morning's closing voluntary. This sprightly chorale fantasy features imitative play on successive phrases of the chorale melody.

Known for her enduring contributions to sacred music, Jane Marshall influenced generations of church musicians through both her compositions and teaching, which she did mostly as a long-time faculty member at Perkins School of Theology at Southern Methodist University. A

Beautiful Thing offers a contemplative and lyrical setting of text from a unique source, Hadewijch of Antwerp, a 13th-century poet and Beguine mystic, whose writings explored themes of divine love, spiritual experiences, and the union of soul with God. Marshall's setting, using modal language and striking changes of mood and texture, highlights the subtlety in the text and effectively conveys the broad visions of the Beguine mystics: that their love and life of service to God was a "beautiful thing."

"Give Me Jesus" is a moving African American spiritual that emerged from the lived experiences of enslaved people in the 19th century. Our **offertory** setting by the prolific composer Mark Hayes, who is known for his creative but reverent takes on traditional melodies, has put his personal touch on the beloved melody, both through his harmonic language and careful choice of text. Using a simple yet profound refrain, the song speaks to the power of faith enduring through suffering and offering hope and spiritual strength—a message that remains poignant today.

This text comes from an eighteen-stanza hymn the author wrote to mark the first anniversary of his life-changing conversion experience. It is now customarily the first hymn in Methodist hymnals worldwide. This tune, adapted from a German composer, is the usual North American setting.

Help Us Accept Each Other




