Presbyterian (USA) pastor, Rev. Dr. Thomas Stewart Coffman died on August 29, 2025, in Houston, Texas, from complications of old age. He was born December 13, 1934, in Omaha, Nebraska and moved to Port Arthur, Texas with his family, where his father served as YMCA Secretary, when he was eight years old. He was the son of Carroll Thomas Coffman and Margaret Stewart Coffman.

Stewart served 113 congregations and 40,000 members in the Houston area as General Presbyter of the Presbytery of New Covenant, from 1999 up to his retirement in 2003. He received a Bachelor of Science degree from Texas A&M in 1956, and a Bachelor of Divinity degree from McCormick Theological Seminary in Chicago in 1960. After studying at the University of Edinburgh, Scotland, he went on to receive his Master of Theology degree in 1977, and Doctor of Ministry degree from Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary in Austin, Texas, in 1979.

Ordained as a Presbyterian minister July 24, 1960, Stewart served five churches in Texas, New Mexico and Wisconsin over a forty-year period. He was also the Associate Executive Presbyter and Pastor to church professionals at Grace Presbytery in the Dallas area for nearly ten years before becoming General Presbyter. After retiring, Stewart served on several community boards in the Pearland area and became a Master Naturalist. One of his most noteworthy projects included collecting used Christmas trees to help build up sand dunes along Texas beaches.

He treasured his years in Aggieland and was a proud member of the Aggie Corps of Cadets, about which he loved to recount stories, including encounters with rival schools as well as his assignment to protect Reveille, the school's mascot. Stewart was a history major and was an avid historian and researcher, who was a member of several Civil War roundtables.


Upon his demise, there were at least 20 business cards in his wallet from history museums he had visited all over the United States and Scotland. Stewart led several church groups on history tours of the Scottish Reformation in Scotland. He loved his work as a pastor and always tried to emphasize that the center of the church is its people. He valued mission work at home and abroad. He was no stranger to grass-roots mission work, and spoke of growing up in Omaha, Nebraska and then in Port Arthur, Texas, where his parents, who were very involved in the community, would take in children who had no place to go. Many nights, he would come home and find some kid in his bed, so would go sleep on the family couch.

Stewart was known for his love of people and nature, and his "devilish sense of humor." He is survived by his daughter, Ann Frautschi, son-in-law, Christopher Frautschi, and granddaughters Amy, Paloma, Lily and Shirley Ann. He was preceded by his parents, his brother Robert Paul Coffman, his wife Shirley Woodell Coffman in 2023, and his daughter Amy Elizabeth Coffman in 1979.
