PW BIRTHDAY OFFERING

On **May 11**, we will have a special offering for the Presbyterian Women's Birthday Offering. You can make a donation online and choose PW Birthday Offering or use the envelopes found in the Narthex. Each year, the Birthday Offering awards grants up to five programs. Primarily making possible capital improvement projects, the Birthday Offering supports domestic and international ministries, focusing on areas such as agricultural development, child care, community organization, criminal justice, drug counseling, economic justice, elderly care, employment training, homelessness, literacy, violence or women's concerns.

This year's Birthday Offering recipients:

Leland Presbyterian Church · Windward Volunteer Housing Facility—Leland, Mississippi—Much of the population around Leland Presbyterian Church, located in the heart of the Mississippi Delta region, struggles with barriers to adequate housing, healthcare and food access. When disaster strikes, residents do not have adequate resources to recover. Volunteers who travel from outside the area to assist in home repairs and community improvements can be the determining factor in whether a family can fully recover.

This Birthday Offering grant will help build a housing facility at Leland Presbyterian Church. Windward Volunteer Housing will offer safe and comfortable accommodations, including showers, laundry equipment and a kitchen. Members of the community who need a temporary place to stay and volunteer groups who come for disaster recovery will find a warm welcome in Leland.

Red Cloud Renewable • Lakota Thiyuha Dome Home Project—Pine Ridge, South Dakota—Tribal communities in the U.S. are experiencing a housing crisis, and the Pine Ridge Reservation alone needs an estimated 4,000 to 5,000 homes. Responding to this great challenge, Red Cloud Renewable, a Native-led grassroots nonprofit organization on the Pine Ridge Reservation, provides free training and workforce development opportunities designed to "teach our tribal relatives to fish."

Thiyuha in Lakota roughly translates to "having a home; starting a family; settling down; creating new life." The Lakota Thiyuha Project aims to increase housing availability through construction of innovative dome homes that are energy efficient, economical, simple in design and easily teachable. The Birthday Offering grant will construct three dome homes, providing housing as well as creating publicity for this affordable option. Construction apprentices will gain experience in this building technique that can rapidly and affordably increase housing availability for Lakota families in need.

Mark Wenzler, director of the Climate Change Initiative at Chautauqua Institution, returns to the Church & Society forum in May to preview an exciting new empathy based strategy for reducing conflict and empowering effective collective action on climate change. May 25—Memorial Day media study with Kate Burkart: Severance.—This wildly creative Apple TV+ hit show, which just concluded its second season in March, appears at first glance to be about an extreme form of work-life balance. A new experimental technology called "severance" allows Lumon Industries employees to undergo surgery where a brain implant allows for their work- and home-life memories to be separated. We will examine the very first episode, "Good News About Hell," which sets the stage for the series, highlighting the ethical and moral dilemmas surrounding the severance process and the characters' attempts to navigate their

Elizabeth Nyuma and her daughters, Oretha and Mabel, own and operate Afri Harvest Farm. Originally from Lofa Kante, Liberia, Elizabeth's parents were killed during the Second Liberian Civil

War (1999 – 2003). Afterwards, she fled with her children to a refugee camp in neighboring Sierra Leone. After five years in the camp, their family permanently resettled in Houston.

Elizabeth speaks English and Kissi fluently. While Elizabeth wasn't lucky enough to complete her schooling, as a teenager she dove straight into business and farming. Growing— for subsistence and her livelihood—has been a lifelong occupation for Elizabeth. Because of her skill as a farmer, she sustained her family in the refugee camp. Today she continues to support her family, and



nourishes the broader Houston community, through her growing acumen.

Elizabeth's garden is located at **8702 Lipan Road**. We hope you can join us as we give a hand in Elizabeth's garden. Gloves and tools will be provided. Just bring your refillable water bottle. MUSICAL CONNECTIONS: SURE ON THIS SHINING NIGHT



All human beings seek connection. It's part of our DNA. Musicians are no different, but the connection they seek I would consider is three-fold: connection with the audience, connection with their fellow performers, and connection to the music itself. For musicians that perform regularly or as their profession, it is exceedingly rare that all three coalesce in one moment, but chasing that moment is what is most exciting.

From the perspective of both the performers and audience, are countless variables that go into finding these connections, not least of which is the innate way a particular piece of music speaks to you. In choral music, there are even more variables still, considering quality of text, how the composer pairs text with their music, the blending of voices in the choir, leadership of the conductor, acoustics of the room...the list goes on and on. You can spend a lifetime chasing the moment where everything aligns just right.

A "shining" example of one such alignment is "Sure on this Shining Night," a serene setting of a James Agee poem included in Morten Lauridsen's set of *Nocturnes*. Through its beautiful melodies, lush piano writing, and most importantly, a commitment to the amplifying the mood and expressions found in the text Lauridsen creates the opportunity for connection: the pianist and conductor to the choir, each chorister to each other, and the choir to the listener. And, who doesn't love the key of D-flat major.

Enjoy a wonderful performance of Lauridsen's "Sure on this Shining Night" by the LA Master Chorale, and if you were unable to attend the St. Philip music program's concert on May 4, check out the live-stream! The St. Philip choir also sang this piece beautifully.
