

WORSHIP NOTES

Advent Candle lighting is led this week by the Godly Play Sunday School class. Teachers are Omi Ford, Joyce Fox and Ruthie Waldrop.

To receive communion today, please come forward via the center aisle and receive a piece of bread. Gluten-free bread is also available You may dip the bread in the chalice of grape juice and receive communion by intinction or you may take from the tray a small cup of grape juice. You may return to your pew via the side aisles. Those who have difficulty coming forward may receive communion in their seats by signaling the servers. Because the table of Jesus Christ is open to all, everyone is welcome to receive communion today.



An additional offering is received when communion is celebrated. The Christmas Joy Offering has been a cherished Presbyterian tradition since the 1930s. The Offering distributes gifts equally to the Assistance Program of the Board of Pensions and to Presbyterian-related schools and colleges equipping communities of

color. The Assistance Program provides critical financial support to church workers and their families. Presbyterian-related schools and colleges provide education and leadership development while nurturing racial and ethnic heritage. This has been a Presbyterian commitment for nearly 140 years. Gifts may be brought to the front basket during the final hymn. You may also make a secure contribution through MyStPhilip and choosing the Communion fund or by sending a check to the church office, with "Communion" in the memo line.

Today's worship service includes traditional Negro Spiritual music. The Black composers of this music are unknown to history and therefore unable to receive royalties directed to their estates for the use of their songs. To remedy this inequity, a fund has been created and approved by the Session where we will collect voluntary "royalties" for using this music. Anyone may donate to the fund by going to the <u>saintphilip.net</u> homepage and selecting *Make a Contribution*, then selecting Negro Spirituals as the fund. Members can also access this page on the MyStPhilip app (also linked to from the homepage). You may also contribute by writing a check with *Negro Spirituals* in the memo line and placing it in the offering plate or mailing it to the church office. This small gesture of reparation seeks to help heal the long history of injury to Black persons. Contributions received over the course of the year will be donated annually to a local organization supporting Black musical traditions.

MUSIC NOTES

Hugo Distler was one of the pioneers of what is often called the "neo-Baroque" movement in the early 20th century, an appellation that acknowledges the contrapuntal yet modernist tonal and rhythmic idioms of these composers. A lifelong church musician, Distler left a small number of works to posterity, among which are two sets of organ pieces on familiar Advent chorales: *Wachet auf, ruft uns die Stimme* ("Sleepers, Wake, A Voice is Calling") and *Nun komm, der Heiden Heiland* ("Savior of the Nations, Come"). Both chorales date from the 16th century, when this musical idiom was the rage among Luther's many followers. Today's **opening** and **closing voluntaries** are both drawn from the outer portions of the latter work, which includes a quirky set of variations, a grandiose chaconne, and a fiery toccata.

Our **offertory** is J. S. Bach's setting of the former chorale melody. Bach's original version of this famous trio may be found in his church cantata *Wachet auf*, where it's

scored for violin obbligato, tenor, and continuo. The composer's arrangement for solo organ appeared in a collection of six such works published in 1748 by Johann Georg Schübler, long known colloquially as the "Schübler Chorales."

Today's **introit** is a concise choral arrangement of *Nun komm, der Heiden Heiland* by John Ferguson, who was for many years on the music faculty of St Olaf College in Northfield, MN and director of music at Central Lutheran Church in Minneapolis. This morning's anthem, by local composer David Ashley White, invests its familiar Advent text with an uncommon urgency, thanks to unpredictable dance-like rhythms throughout. In this setting these familiar words lose whatever sentimentality they might otherwise convey; instead, we are urged toward making the necessary spiritual preparations for the coming of the Lord.



MONDAYS IN ADVENT-LECTIO DIVINA ON **ZOOM – Dec. 4, 11, and 18** at 9:00-9:20 a.m. – What is Lectio Divina? The ancient desert fathers and mothers believed that scripture was like a love letter written to us by God. Thus, the meditative, guided scriptural reflection known as Lectio Divina ("divine reading") assumes that God speaks to us intimately, God is already praying in us, and we'll experience a profound encounter with the heart of God, rather than an intellectual study of scripture. Keatan King will guide the group through the four cycles of Lectio (read, reflect, respond, rest) for 20 minutes every Monday morning at 9:00 a.m. for the season of Advent. 



This Advent text artfully interweaves what is hidden and what is revealed, primarily in the coming of the long-awaited Messiah. But Christ himself taught us about another hidden truth, his presence in the "least of these" (Matthew 25:40, 45), whom we are also called to welcome.

This spiritual reflects on Jesus' saying about the endtimes as recorded in Matthew 24:29–30/Mark 13:24–26. It belongs to the slower, less common style of spirituals with long, sustained phrases and was among those popularized in concerts by the Fisk Jubilee Singers.



This text uses imagery from Jeremiah 33:14–16 and Matthew 24:29–36/Mark 13:24–32/Luke 21:25–36. These passages are especially associated with the beginning of Advent, a season that looks forward to Christ's second coming while also preparing us to remember his first coming.
