



WORSHIP NOTES

Today's worship service includes traditional Negro Spiritual music. The Black composers of this music are unknown to history and therefore unable to receive royalties directed to their estates for the use of their songs. To remedy this inequity, a Session-approved fund has been created where we will collect voluntary "royalties" for using this music. Anyone may donate to the fund by going to the saintphilip.net homepage and selecting Make a Contribution, then selecting Negro Spirituals as the fund. Members can also access this page on the MyStPhilip app (also linked to from the homepage). You may also contribute by writing a check with Negro Spirituals in the memo line and placing it in the offering plate or mailing it to the church office. This small gesture of reparation seeks to help heal the long history of injury to Black persons. Contributions received over the course of the year will be donated annually to a local organization supporting Black musical traditions.

MUSIC NOTES

The American Negro Spiritual Tradition

While it can likely be said that all sacred songs are generally spiritual in nature, the spirituals of Black American culture make one of the strongest and most unique statements of faith in the entire American song tradition. Indeed, the African American spiritual (also called the Negro Spiritual) constitutes one of the largest and most significant forms of American folksong. The texts of these songs reveal the simplicity and very personal nature of the spiritual. They speak of joy, faith, heaven, struggle, and a deep longing for freedom and peace. Spirituals are most closely associated with the enslavement of African people in the American South between 1619 and 1865. The songs proliferated most in the last few decades of the eighteenth century leading up to the abolishment of legalized slavery in the 1860s. While the songs were born out of this very dark period in American history, these songs are now sung, celebrated, and revered all around the world.* The music in today's service represents but a tiny, tiny sampling of the enduring melodies and texts from what is truly a remarkable body of traditional song literature.

Born of incalculable suffering, the history of the American Negro Spiritual is nevertheless at once rich, moving, and filled with great hope and promise. Some sources for more background and information may be found here:

Piano Music

This morning's opening voluntary features two popular spirituals as arranged for piano by two different living American composers. Mark Haves' arrangement of Deep River features long phrases of sixteenthnote figures depicting the wide expanse of a flowing river, leading to an ornamented setting of the spiritual melody over a jazz-inspired harmonic accompaniment. Hayes is a 1975 graduate of Baylor University, and he has over 90 piano books in print traversing a wide range of styles from gospel to classical to jazz and show tunes. Paired with Hayes' reflective 2021 setting of Deep River this morning is Emma Lou Diemer's rousing arrangement of Every Time I Feel the Spirit, composed some 20 years earlier in 2001. Diemer taught for many years at the University of California at Santa Barbara. A prolific composer of keyboard music - most of her large catalog is devoted to music for the organ - she is fond of updating familiar hymn melodies in subtly unconventional ways.

Today's **offertory voluntary** sets a quieter tone for our celebration of Juneteenth with an arrangement by American composer John Carter of the spiritual *Let Us Break Bread Together*. Published in 1990, Carter's setting features the traditional spiritual melody accompanied by rich harmonies in the Black spiritual tradition. Carter was educated at Trinity University in San Antonio and Peabody College in Nashville, and he served as a church musician in Presbyterian, Methodist, American Baptist, and United Church of Christ congregations.

We welcome guest pianist Osip Nikiforov to our roster of musicians this morning! First Prize winner of the 2020 San Antonio Young Artist Tuesday Musical Competition, Osip is a Teaching Fellow in the Doctor of Musical Arts program at the Shepherd School of Music at Rice University, where he studies with Jon Kimura Parker. In addition to playing on concert series and festivals throughout the United States, Osip has given solo recitals in Spain, Israel, South Africa, Russia and Japan. Nearing the completion of his studies at Rice, Osip resides with his wife in St. Paul, Minnesota.

Choral Music

This morning's **anthem** *Steal Away* is the result of a years-long musical collaboration between pianist and conductor Patrick Dupré Quigley and American countertenor Reginald Mobley. The piece marries the traditional Black American spiritual melody *Steal Away* with a quasi-improvisational ostinato accompaniment that defies resolution until the final notes of the piece. The work was premiered in August 2010 by Mobley with arranger Quigley at the piano. Quigley holds degrees from the University of Notre Dame and the Yale School of Music, and he is the founder and director of Miami-based Seraphic Fire, a professional vocal and choral ensemble dedicated to the concert performance of the breadth of history's musical works for the human voice.

Organ Music

Today's **closing voluntary**, another setting of *Every Time I Feel the Spirit*, comes from a much celebrated African-American composer who teaches currently at Dominion University in Norfolk, Virginia. Hailstork's compositions span the gamut, from chamber works to operas, and his music blends elements of various musical traditions.
