

WORSHIP NOTES

Today's Lectionary readings:

- Acts 16:16–34 Paul and Silas are arrested, but an earthquake destroys the prison.
- Psalm 97 The Lord reigns over all the earth; light dawns for the righteous.
- Revelation 22:12-14, 16-17, 20-21 The Lord says: See, I am coming soon. Amen. Come, Lord Jesus!
- John 17:20–26 *Jesus prays that his disciples may be one as he is one with the Father.*

FLOWERS

The flowers today are given by Meg Scott-Johnson and family in memory of Richard B. Johnson, Jr. MD and to the glory of God.

MUSIC NOTES

Composed in the early 18th century, Alessandro Marcello's enduring Oboe Concerto in D minor reflects the expressiveness of Venetian sacred and instrumental music. The haunting **Adagio**, with its lyrical melodic lines, evokes a sense of prayerful reflection, while the final **Presto** movement offers contrast through energy and gracefulness.

Our **introit** comes from the final movement of Vaughan Williams's *Five Mystical Songs*, set to poetry by George Herbert. Celebratory and expansive, the movement captures the text's call to universal praise with bold and uplifting choral singing. Its majestic tone and modal language reflect Vaughan Williams's distinctive style, and has made it an enduring choral staple.

The setting of a beloved American hymn by Houston's own David Ashley White offers a reverent and nuanced interpretation. While preserving the familiar melody attributed to early 19th-century tune books, today's **anthem**

imbues the familiar tune with rich harmonic textures and subtle shifts in dynamics and voicing. A respected composer and long-time professor at the University of Houston, White is also a former oboist, frequently featuring the instrument as a melodic conduit in his liturgical choral works.

Our **offertory**, a paired recitative and aria from Mendels-sohn's mighty oratorio *Elijah*, form a poignant sequence in part one of the larger work. Drawing from Old Testament narratives, Mendelssohn shows his deep admiration for the oratorios of Bach and Handel, combining their contrapuntal and melodic clarity with expressiveness of his own era. In contrast to the severity of the recitative, the aria is lyrical and hopeful, offering assurance that those who genuinely seek God will find Him. The tenor soloist assumes the role of Obidiah, a supportive character who is portrayed as a faithful servant and voice of reason.




This text is a 21st-century metrical paraphrase of the Apostles' Creed (in the manner of Calvin's Strasbourg liturgy). Its connections with Reformed tradition are further strengthened by being set to the tune created for Psalm 42 in the 1551 Genevan Psalter (see also no. 87).

In the *New York Observer* of August 7, 1868, this text was titled "Always Rejoicing," and was attributed to "Pauline T." This may well be where the Baptist pastor and musician to whom it is usually credited encountered the words that he later published with his tune.
