- Matthew 13:1–9, 18–23 Jesus tells and explains the parable of the Sower and the Seeds.


MUSIC NOTES

Organ Music

In the 1830s and 40s Felix Mendelssohn composed, to great acclaim, two volumes of organ works: three preludes & fugues plus six multi-movement sonatas. His organ recitals in England especially had paved the way for both publications, which shows how well German players preserved the technique of revered virtuoso organists like J. S. Bach. Mendelssohn's *Prelude in G Major* is one of the most tuneful movements from either set, while the Allegro maestoso from *Sonata No.* 2 (in C minor) is a stirring *organo pleno* movement.

Instrumental Music

As published in London sometime in the early 1730s, Handel's "Opus 1" was an unauthorized collection of sonatas for melody instrument and continuo, some of which weren't even from Handel's pen. Meant for a variety of solo instruments (flute, recorder, oboe, or violin), these pieces adapt well to different surroundings. From that collection we offer today one of the authentic sonatas, doubtless intended for violin. With four movements in alternating slow and fast tempi, it follows the traditional format of the late Baroque sonata da chiesa or "church sonata."

Have you ever looked at the effects of climate change and the apathy of so many Christians around you and wondered, "What are we missing here?" Why has the U.S church struggled so mightily to understand the climate crisis as a moral and gospel issue, and instead so often abandoned it to the domain of the culture wars? In these lectures, we will trace some of the historical reasons for the U.S. church's lukewarm engagement with climate change, explore how Scripture might be able to guide us toward a more faithful way forward, and plot out an active and hopeful path for the church as we all strive to follow Jesus more closely in a warming world.

Rev. Kyle Meyaard-Schaap serves as the Vice President of the Evangelical Environmental Network. He holds an undergraduate degree in religious studies from Calvin University (B.A. '12), a Master of Divinity degree from Western Theological Seminary (M.Div. '16), and is ordained in the Christian Reformed Church in North America (CRCNA). For the last eleven years, he has educated and mobilized Christians around the world to address the climate crisis as an act of discipleship and neighbor-love.

In the course of many revisions, the original eucharistic emphasis of this text has shifted to a hymn of thanksgiving for a wide range of human experience, with a Christological summation. It is set here to the tune that is customary in North America, though not elsewhere.

The opening line of this hymn was inspired by the three divine attributes listed in 1 Timothy 1:17 (King James Version), and it continues by considering how God's life exceeds our own finite existence. The text is well set to a Welsh melody shaped by many three-note units.
