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MUSIC NOTES

Organ Music

The Portuguese musician Carlos Seixas, who at the age of fourteen began his career as a cathedral organist, eventually served the court chapel in Lisbon. A virtuoso harpsichordist and teacher, he taught numerous members of the royal family and left a sizable collection of keyboard sonatas. His *Sonata in A Major*, like most of his works, incorporates idiomatic figuration throughout, mostly in two very active voices.

"Padre" Antonio Soler was for many years head of the court chapel in Madrid and keyboard teacher to members of the Spanish royal family. His sonatas, often compared with those of Domenico Scarlatti, explore the sounds of keyboard instruments in memorable ways. In the *Sonata de clarines*, he finds just the right musical gestures for the fiery reed stops of Iberian organs.

Choral Music

This morning's **introit** is by American composer Gordon Young, who was a student of Alexander McCurdy at the Curtis Institute. Young later taught organ on the faculty of Wayne State University. *Now Let Us All Praise God and Sing* was composed in 1960 for the choir of First Presbyterian Church, Detroit, where the composer served as music director for fifteen years.

Today's **first anthem** features familiar words attributed to St. Patrick in a setting by English composer Oliver Tarney, who was educated at Manchester University. Tarney is now Head of Academic Music and Composition at Winchester College, and he sings regularly with the Winchester Cathedral choir. *Christ Be with Me* was composed in 2017.

The offertory anthem *Come, O Come, Our Voices Raise* was composed in 2016 for St. Francis Episcopal Church in Potomac Parish, Maryland by British organist, conductor and composer Malcolm Archer. Prior to his retirement in 2017, Archer served at cathedrals in Norwich, Bristol, Wells, and St. Paul's Cathedral in London, and finally as Director of Chapel Music at Winchester College.


BACK-TO-SCHOOL COLLECTION

Rev. Kyle Meyaard-Schaap,

Vice President of the Evangelical Environmental Network and author, Following Jesus in a Warming World

Have you ever looked at the effects of climate change and the apathy of so many Christians around you and wondered, "What are we missing here?" Why has the U.S church struggled so mightily to understand the climate crisis as a moral and gospel issue, and instead so often abandoned it to the domain of the culture wars? In these lectures, we will trace some of the historical reasons for the U.S. church's lukewarm engagement with climate change, explore how Scripture might be able to guide us toward a more faithful way forward, and plot out an active and hopeful path for the church as we all strive to follow Jesus more closely in a warming world.

Rev. Kyle Meyaard-Schaap serves as the Vice President of the Evangelical Environmental Network. He holds an undergraduate degree in religious studies from Calvin University (B.A. '12), a Master of Divinity degree from Western Theological Seminary (M.Div. '16), and is ordained in the Christian Reformed Church in North America (CRCNA). For the last eleven years, he has educated and mobilized Christians around the world to address the climate crisis as an act of discipleship and neighbor-love.
