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MUSIC NOTES

Instrumental Music

Georg Philipp Telemann, one of the most prolific composers of all time, created chamber works for practically any combination of instruments in use in the early eighteenth century. Today's opening and offertory voluntaries comprise two movements each from one of his "concertos" for for transverse flute and obbligato harpsichord. (The latter qualification indicates a fully realized part for both hands at the keyboard, unlike most "figured-bass" accompaniments of this era.) The division of labor in such a piece is what makes them atypical: unlike a Baroque trio sonata with two melody instruments plus continuo players, this piece assigns three musical lines to two players instead.

Vocal Music

The Bach aria "Wer Gott bekennt" comes from a cantata first heard in Leipzig on 11 August 1726. Set to an anonymous libretto, the work as a whole reinforces that Sunday's Gospel (from Luke 12), which obliges the faithful to recognize our obliga-

tion to God. The aria—scored delicately for flute, alto, and continuo—makes a sobering distinction between those who truly love God and those who fail to fully engage with God.

Organ Music

In 1641 the Thuringian poet Georg Neumark composed both the text and tune of *Wer nur den lieben Gott läßt walten*. An example of the newly fashionable *Trostlied* (a song of consolation), its first two lines nicely summarize the chorale's entire message: "Let God be God and trust in Him." A favorite of Lutherans since the late seventeenth century, it remains popular among German composers especially; one finds it in everything from concerted works to contemporary film soundtracks. Bach treated its sturdy melody multiple times, including a concise setting heard at the close of today's service.


BACK-TO-SCHOOL COLLECTION

Rev. Kyle Meyaard-Schaap,

Vice President of the Evangelical Environmental Network and author, Following Jesus in a Warming World

Have you ever looked at the effects of climate change and the apathy of so many Christians around you and wondered, "What are we missing here?" Why has the U.S church struggled so mightily to understand the climate crisis as a moral and gospel issue, and instead so often abandoned it to the domain of the culture wars? In these lectures, we will trace some of the historical reasons for the U.S. church's lukewarm engagement with climate change, explore how Scripture might be able to guide us toward a more faithful way forward, and plot out an active and hopeful path for the church as we all strive to follow Jesus more closely in a warming world.

Rev. Kyle Meyaard-Schaap serves as the Vice President of the Evangelical Environmental Network. He holds an undergraduate degree in religious studies from Calvin University (B.A. '12), a Master of Divinity degree from Western Theological Seminary (M.Div. '16), and is ordained in the Christian Reformed Church in North America (CRCNA). For the last eleven years, he has educated and mobilized Christians around the world to address the climate crisis as an act of discipleship and neighbor-love.




